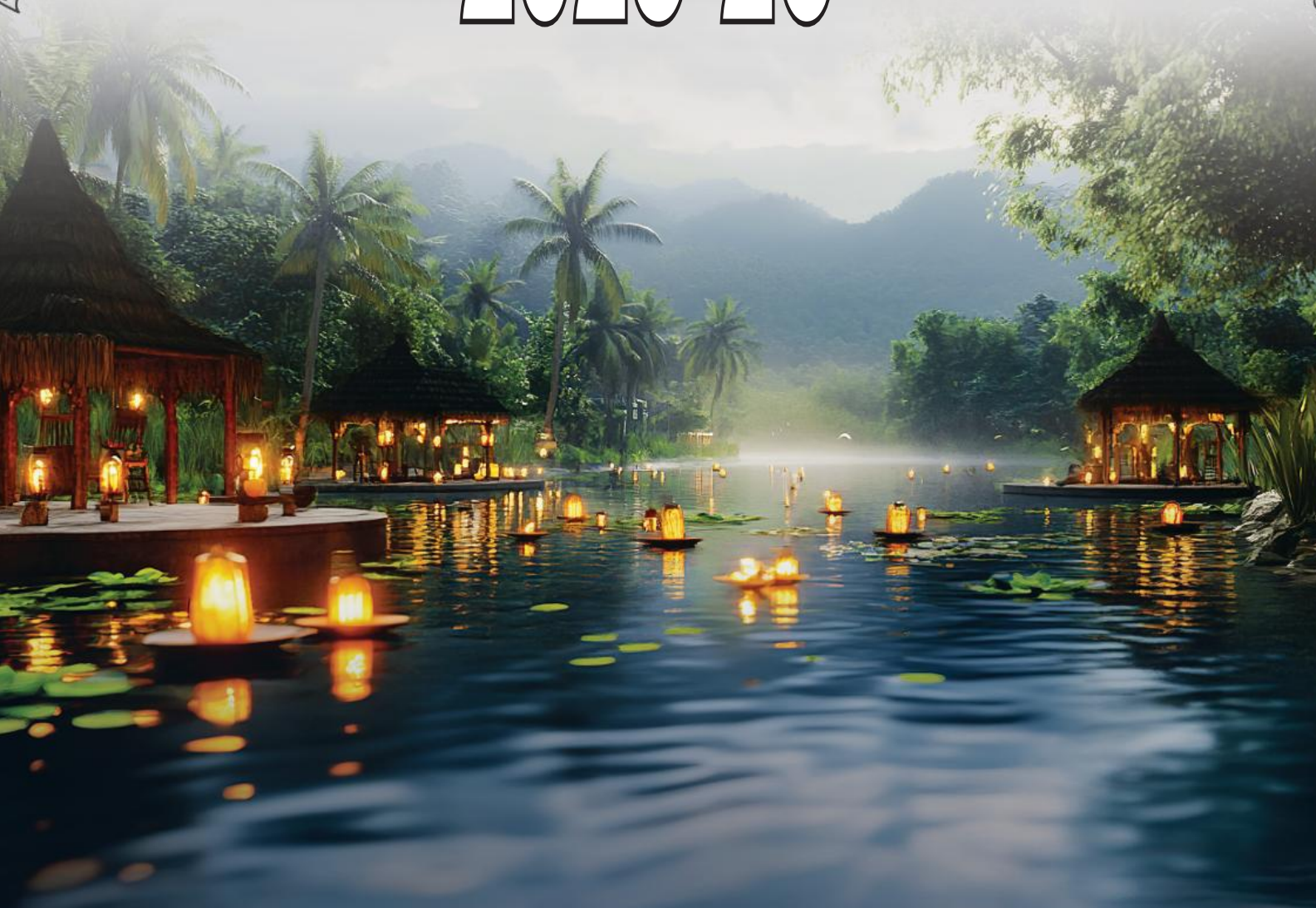
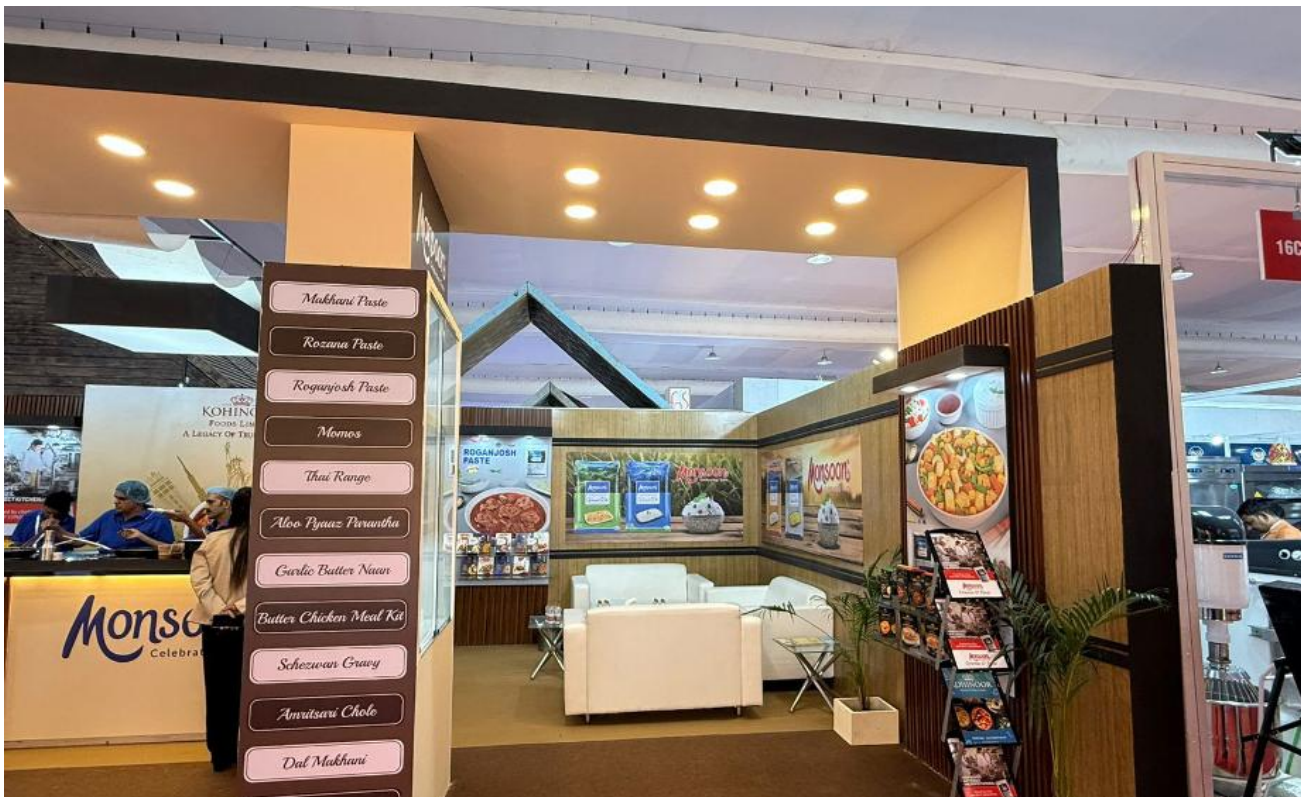

CHAIRMAN MESSAGE



Dear Members,

It is my privilege to write to you and present the Annual Report of your Company for the financial year 2025-26.

I hope this letter finds you safe and in good health.

In last year's Annual Report, I had highlighted the challenges faced by the business and the Company's performance during a demanding period. The rice industry continues to remain inherently volatile, impacted by factors such as climate change, geopolitical uncertainty, fluctuating demand, and evolving trade dynamics.

Despite these continuing challenges, the Company delivered improved operational performance during the year and remained focused on strengthening its business for long-term growth.

Your Company remains committed to creating long-term shareholder value while delivering shared value for customers, associates, suppliers, business partners, and communities. With your continued trust and support, Kohinoor Foods is gradually rebuilding momentum after a difficult phase marked by financial constraints, economic pressures, liquidity challenges, and the impact of the pandemic. Although export

markets remained subdued due to global economic uncertainty and operational limitations, the Company continues to work steadily towards strengthening its presence in domestic and international markets.

The India Rice Market Report Includes Production Analysis (Volume), Consumption Analysis (Value and Volume), Export Analysis (Value and Volume), Import Analysis (Value and Volume), and Price Trend Analysis. The Market Forecasts are Provided in Terms of Value (USD) and Volume (Metric Tons).

The India rice market size in 2026 is estimated at USD 49.32 billion, growing from 2025 value of USD 47.1 billion with 2031 projections showing USD 62.09 billion, growing at 4.72% CAGR over 2026-2031. India accounts for 30.3% of global rice exports, with domestic production projected to reach 151 million metric tons in 2025-26, establishing the country as a significant influence on global rice prices. The removal of the September 2024 ban on non-basmati white rice exports has increased export opportunities, while increased minimum support prices (MSP) support farmer income and encourage production capacity growth. The adoption of advanced technologies, including genome-edited varieties and remote-sensing water management systems, is enhancing production efficiency and improving product traceability for export markets.

Per-capita rice consumption is increasing in Indian metropolitan areas where changing lifestyles drive demand for convenient, nutritionally enhanced staples. Government surveys indicate growing differences in cereal preferences between rural and urban areas, leading suppliers to develop high-protein and low-glycemic index products that can command higher prices. The International Rice Research Institute has enhanced protein content to 15.99%, while the black-grained BPT 2841 variety offers increased lysine content, appealing to health-conscious consumers. Rice suppliers are investing in new varieties, improved packaging, and multi-channel distribution to capture urban market share. This trend has increased value realization across the supply chain, benefiting farmers who meet quality standards.

The Minimum Support Price (MSP) for paddy increased to INR 2,369 per quintal (USD 28.4) for 2025-26, maintaining the policy of ensuring 1.5 times the production cost. Government procurement increased from 761.40 lakh metric tons in 2014-15 to 1,062.69 lakh metric tons in 2022-23, increasing farmer earnings from INR 1.06 lakh crore (USD 12.8 billion) to INR 2.28 lakh crore (USD 27.5 billion). This price protection encourages farmers to adopt high-yield hybrid varieties without concerns of market oversupply, although the domestic price floor may reduce export competitiveness. The concentration of procurement in West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh, and Punjab creates regional income disparities and influences crop selection patterns in these regions.

India's agricultural mechanization rate of 40-45% indicates significant potential for improvement through precision planters, direct-seeded rice techniques, and laser-leveled irrigation systems. Research



conducted across four states demonstrates that direct-seeded rice reduces cultivation costs by 79% and increases net earnings per acre by 62%. Remote-sensing data from Punjab indicates 20-40% water conservation without compromising crop yields, highlighting improved climate resilience. Government initiatives, including SMAM subsidies and an INR 500 crore (USD 60.2 million) genome-editing fund, support technology adoption, particularly through smallholder service platforms that consolidate demand. These improvements create a cycle of enhanced productivity that addresses increasing labor shortages.

Extreme precipitation events were observed during the 2024 monsoon, affecting agricultural fields in Gujarat, Andhra Pradesh, and Telangana. Analysis indicates that rainfall exceeding 1,621 mm negatively impacts Kharif crop yields. Climate projections indicate a potential 20% decline in irrigated crop yields in Uttar Pradesh, while rain-fed areas may experience slight improvements. Farmers are responding by adjusting planting schedules and adopting drought-resistant crop varieties, though infrastructure development for climate resilience remains inconsistent across regions.

Small landholdings averaging below 1.1 hectares restrict mechanization and increase per-unit input costs. Direct-seeded rice trials demonstrate yield improvements in Uttar Pradesh, while results vary in Madhya Pradesh due to diverse soil conditions. Hybrid seeds, despite offering 2-metric tons per hectare higher yields, cost 3-4 times more than open-pollinated varieties, making them less accessible to small farmers. Punjab's decision to ban hybrid paddy by 2025, following Food Corporation of India's quality concerns, highlights the challenge of balancing productivity gains with market requirements.

The packaged food market size was valued at USD 6.34 trillion in 2025 and estimated to grow from USD 6.61 trillion in 2026 to reach USD 8.15 trillion by 2031, at a CAGR of 4.28% during the forecast period (2026-2031). Rapid urbanization, rising disposable income in emerging economies, and consumers' preference for convenient yet nutrient-dense products are redefining category dynamics. Demand is gravitating toward natural, organic, and free-from options, while functional claims such as probiotic, high-protein, and fortified benefits migrate from niche lines into mainstream shelves. Distribution patterns are fragmenting as e-commerce compresses delivery windows below fifteen minutes in dense cities, obliging supermarkets to retrofit micro-fulfillment zones. Meanwhile, sustainability mandates are accelerating material innovation, shifting packaging away from single-use plastics toward fiber-based or enzymatically recyclable substrates, even at a 15-25% cost premium. Competitive intensity in the packaged food market is rising as incumbents prune underperforming SKUs and acquire plant-based specialists to secure relevance with younger cohorts.

Growing consumer interest in ethnic and global flavor exploration is significantly driving innovation and product development in the packaged food market. Increasing cultural exposure through travel, digital media, and multicultural urban populations has encouraged consumers to experiment with international cuisines and diverse taste profiles. Packaged food manufacturers are responding by introducing products inspired by Asian, Latin American, Middle Eastern, and Mediterranean flavors to meet evolving taste preferences. This trend is particularly strong among younger consumers seeking novel and authentic culinary experiences in convenient formats. Limited-edition launches, fusion flavors, and regionally inspired recipes are helping brands differentiate their offerings in competitive retail environments in the packaged food market. Additionally, the rising popularity of ready-to-eat meals and snack products featuring global seasonings supports higher consumer engagement and repeat purchases.

Consumers are driving growth in the packaged food market by prioritizing nutrition and preventive health in their daily diets. Rising awareness of lifestyle-related health issues, such as obesity, diabetes, and digestive concerns, is pushing demand for products with enhanced nutritional benefits. The International Diabetes Federation (IDF) reports that in 2024, 589 million adults aged 20-79 lived with diabetes, with projections reaching 853 million by 2050[1]. Manufacturers are introducing fortified foods, high-protein snacks, probiotic items, and products enriched with vitamins, minerals, and fiber. Health-conscious buyers increasingly prefer clean-label formulations, reduced sugar content, and natural ingredients. The International Food Information Council's Food and Health Survey 2024 shows that 67% of Americans consider healthfulness crucial in food and beverage choices, highlighting wellness trends' strong influence on purchasing behavior. Interest in immunity-boosting and functional ingredients continues to grow in the packaged food market, driven by a focus on long-term health management.

Consumers are showing a stronger preference for brands that adopt eco-friendly materials, reduce plastic usage, and promote recyclability or biodegradability in packaging formats. Manufacturers are investing in lightweight packaging, paper-based alternatives, and reusable designs to align with sustainability goals while maintaining product safety and shelf life. Sustainable packaging also enhances brand perception, particularly among environmentally conscious consumers seeking responsible



consumption choices. According to the 2024 IFIC Food & Health Survey, foods labeled as “Natural,” “Organic,” or “Healthy” are among the top in-store signals, with 36% of American consumers preferring such attributes, reflecting the broader shift toward transparency and sustainability in food products. This preference encourages companies in the packaged food market to integrate sustainable packaging with clean-label positioning to strengthen product appeal. As regulatory pressure and consumer expectations continue to rise, sustainable packaging innovation remains a key strategic focus for packaged food manufacturers.

Since 2017–18, the Company has remained focused on overcoming financial challenges and restoring its position in the market. This journey requires time, perseverance, disciplined execution, and the continued confidence of stakeholders. During 2025–26, the Board further reinforced this commitment through focused initiatives aimed at business recovery and sustainable growth.

Your Board remains committed to maintaining high standards of corporate governance and will continue to review and strengthen governance practices. The Board’s experience and strategic guidance provide confidence as the Company navigates a rapidly changing business environment and works towards its purpose of building a stronger and more sustainable future for all stakeholders.

During the year, your Company achieved total turnover of INR 1,588.69 million, compared with INR 875.93 million in the previous year. The rice business contributed INR 963.70 million, compared with INR 5.58 million in the previous year, while the food business contributed INR 490.95 million, compared with INR 836.99 million in the previous financial year. Despite liquidity constraints, the food factory continued operations effectively, supporting production and revenue generation.

The Company has also begun scaling up operations and exploring further opportunities in the food business to optimize its marketing network, regain market share, and strengthen customer reach. Direct exports of rice and food products to various countries have also commenced.

KFL continues to participate in domestic and international markets through its established brands across rice, processed food, and packaged food categories.

To improve the Company’s financial and business position, the management is actively evaluating the following key initiatives:

- a. Identifying suitable investors for fund infusion.
- b. Expanding presence in global markets.
- c. Expanding the product portfolio.
- d. Expanding the customer base.
- e. Leveraging market expertise and business relationships.
- f. Improving operational efficiencies.
- g. Launching food products on domestic e-commerce platforms.

The Company is pursuing these initiatives with focus and discipline to improve business performance and support smoother operations.

With the objective of bringing authentic Indian flavours to consumers worldwide, your Company aims to make Kohinoor Foods Ltd. a leading name in the global food business. The Board's Report has been prepared based on the standalone financial statements of the Company.

Operations

During the Year, your company focused on the restructuring of the company operations due to various constraint faced due to financial crisis, various measures have been taken for reduction of the cost of operation. Despite the factors faced by the company during the year, your company remains committed to providing world-class products to its consumer, focused on improving operational efficiencies across its functions and enhancing its reach to the global consumers.

For the financial year under review 2025-26, the contribution made by Rice to the Company's business is INR 963.70 million as against INR 5.58 million in previous year while the Food Business stood at INR 490.95 million as against INR 836.99 million in the last financial year.

The year saw an increase of 17,167.62% in Rice Business and a decrease in 41.34% in food business in sales in value terms in comparison to last year's sales. Sales market was down due to instability in the overseas market and the financial constraint faced by the Company.

Subsidiaries / Joint Venture

USA Operations

Kohinoor Foods USA Inc. was incorporated in year 2000 in the state of New Jersey, USA, as a wholly owned subsidiary of Kohinoor Foods Limited (KFL), India, to cater to the markets of US & Canada. The brand 'Kohinoor' is well known in USA for its quality rice and food items.

However, during the current year this company did not carry any business as there is no export sales for KFL India to US & Canada, at present the office is closed due to no business.

Food Business

During the year 2025-26, in processed & packaged food products the company did business of around INR 490.95 million as against INR 836.99 million in the previous year. The food factory has continued its operation effectively, which improved our production & revenues from food business inspite of the liquidity problem and Global Political Market hindrance.

Australia, USA, Canada are major markets for our range of processed & packaged food products.

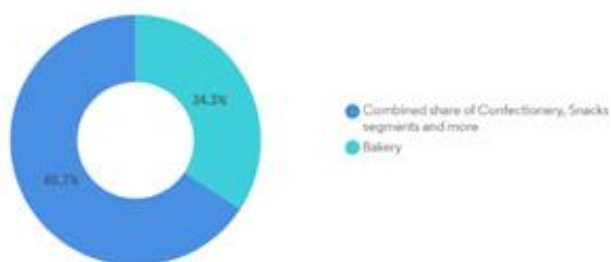
Innovation in sustainable and recyclable packaging solutions

Innovation in sustainable and recyclable packaging solutions is increasingly supporting growth in the packaged food market as environmental concerns influence consumer purchasing behavior. Food manufacturers are adopting recyclable, biodegradable, and compostable materials to reduce environmental impact while maintaining product safety and shelf stability. The shift toward lightweight packaging and reduced plastic usage also helps companies lower transportation costs and carbon emissions. In addition, sustainable packaging enhances brand value and strengthens consumer trust, particularly among environmentally conscious buyers. Governments and regulatory bodies are further encouraging the adoption of eco-friendly packaging through stricter waste management and recycling regulations. Companies in the packaged food market are also investing in packaging designs that improve recyclability without compromising convenience or product quality.

Health concerns related to sugar, salt, and preservatives

Growing health concerns related to high levels of sugar, salt, and preservatives are limiting the growth potential of the packaged food market as consumers become more cautious about ingredient consumption. Increasing awareness of lifestyle-related conditions such as obesity, hypertension, diabetes, and cardiovascular diseases has led consumers to scrutinize nutritional labels more carefully. Many packaged food products are often perceived as highly processed, which can discourage health-conscious consumers from frequent consumption. Regulatory bodies across several countries are also introducing stricter labeling requirements and reformulation guidelines to reduce sodium and sugar content in processed foods. This has increased pressure on manufacturers to reformulate products while maintaining taste, texture, and shelf life, often leading to higher production costs. Additionally, negative consumer perception toward artificial preservatives and additives is encouraging a shift toward fresh or minimally processed alternatives in the packaged food market.

Rising input, labor, energy, and production costs

Rising input, labor, energy, and production costs are posing significant challenges to the packaged food market, impacting profitability and pricing strategies for manufacturers. Fluctuations in the cost of raw materials such as grains, dairy, oils, and sweeteners directly affect production expenses, while increasing labor costs add to operational overheads. Energy-intensive processes, including manufacturing, refrigeration, and transportation, further contribute to higher production costs. These rising expenses often force companies to adjust product pricing, which can affect consumer demand, particularly in price-sensitive segments. Supply chain disruptions and inflationary pressures in key markets exacerbate cost volatility, making long-term planning more challenging for manufacturers. Additionally, smaller and mid-sized producers may face greater difficulty absorbing these costs compared to larger, integrated firms, potentially limiting their market competitiveness.

Segment Analysis

By Product Type: Dairy Alternatives Disrupt Legacy Categories

Bakery products accounted for the largest share of the packaged food market in 2025, contributing 34.27% of total market revenue, primarily driven by their widespread consumption and strong consumer familiarity across regions. Products such as bread, biscuits, cakes, pastries, and savory baked snacks continue to serve as convenient meal and snacking options for consumers with busy lifestyles. The segment benefits from frequent product innovation, including healthier formulations such as whole grain, high-fiber, and reduced-sugar variants, which help maintain strong demand among health-conscious consumers. In addition, the expansion of organized retail and online grocery platforms has improved product accessibility across the packaged food market and visibility, further strengthening sales performance.

Dairy and dairy alternatives are projected to be the fastest-growing segment in the packaged food market, expected to register a CAGR of 4.81% through 2031. Growth in this segment is largely supported by increasing consumer awareness regarding nutrition, protein intake, and functional health benefits associated with dairy-based products. At the same time, rising lactose intolerance awareness and the growing popularity of plant-based diets have accelerated demand for dairy alternatives such as almond, soy, oat, and coconut-based products. Manufacturers in the packaged food market are actively expanding product portfolios with fortified, low-fat, and probiotic-rich offerings to cater to evolving consumer preferences. The introduction of innovative flavors, convenient packaging formats, and ready-to-consume dairy beverages has further strengthened market expansion.



By Category: Natural and Organic Segments Gain Share

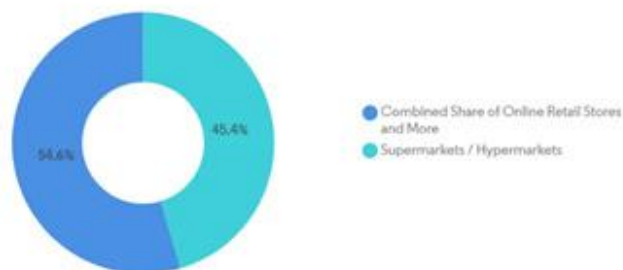
The natural, organic, and free-from category is forecast to grow at 5.43% through 2031, significantly outpacing the conventional segment, which held 76.38% of the market in 2025. This divergence reflects a structural shift in consumer priorities, where ingredient provenance and production methods are becoming primary purchase drivers, particularly among urban millennials and Gen Z cohorts who demonstrate higher willingness to pay for certified organic and non-GMO products. Conventional products remain dominant due to price sensitivity in emerging markets and rural areas, where income constraints limit access to premium-priced alternatives, yet even within this segment, manufacturers are introducing "better-for-you" sub-brands that incorporate whole grains, reduced sodium, and no artificial additives to capture trade-up demand.

Certification standards like USDA Organic, EU Organic, and India Organic are emerging as key differentiators. Retailers are now dedicating premium shelf space to these certified products. Meanwhile, e-commerce platforms are incorporating organic filters, enhancing product visibility. However, the category's expansion faces hurdles. Organic raw materials demand specialized handling and traceability, pushing logistics costs up by 10-15%. This added expense poses challenges, especially for smaller manufacturers looking to enter the market.

By Distribution Channel: E-Commerce Reshapes Retail Economics

Supermarkets and hypermarkets accounted for the largest share of the packaged food market in 2025, representing 45.38% of total sales, primarily due to their extensive product assortment and strong consumer trust. These retail formats offer consumers the advantage of one-stop shopping, allowing them to compare multiple brands, product types, and price ranges within a single location. The availability of promotional offers, bulk purchasing options, and private-label products further strengthens consumer preference for these channels. In addition, well-established supply chains and efficient inventory management enable supermarkets and hypermarkets to maintain consistent product availability, particularly for high-demand packaged food categories.

Packaged Food Market: Market Share by Distribution Channel, 2025



Online retail is projected to be the fastest-growing distribution channel in the packaged food market, expected to expand at a CAGR of 5.57% during 2026-2031. The increasing adoption of smartphones, improved internet penetration, and the growing popularity of digital payment systems have significantly accelerated online grocery purchases. Consumers are increasingly attracted to the convenience of home delivery, flexible ordering options, and access to a wider range of domestic and international packaged food products. E-commerce platforms in the packaged food market also provide personalized recommendations, subscription-based purchasing models, and competitive pricing, which enhance consumer engagement and loyalty.

Basmati Rice

Overview of Rice Industry

The India Rice Market Report Includes Production Analysis (Volume), Consumption Analysis (Value and Volume), Export Analysis (Value and Volume), Import Analysis (Value and Volume), and Price Trend Analysis. The Market Forecasts are Provided in Terms of Value (USD) and Volume (Metric Tons).

The India rice market size in 2026 is estimated at USD 49.32 billion, growing from 2025 value of USD 47.1 billion with 2031 projections showing USD 62.09 billion, growing at 4.72% CAGR over 2026-2031. India accounts for 30.3% of global rice exports, with domestic production projected to reach 151 million metric tons in 2025-26, establishing the country as a significant influence on global rice prices. The removal of the September 2024 ban on non-basmati white rice exports has increased export opportunities, while increased minimum support prices (MSP) support farmer income and encourage production capacity growth. The adoption of advanced technologies, including genome-edited varieties and remote-sensing water management systems, is enhancing production efficiency and improving product traceability for export markets.

Per-capita rice consumption is increasing in Indian metropolitan areas where changing lifestyles drive demand for convenient, nutritionally enhanced staples. Government surveys indicate growing differences in cereal preferences between rural and urban areas, leading suppliers to develop high-protein and low-glycemic index products that can command higher prices. The International Rice Research Institute has enhanced protein content to 15.99%, while the black-grained BPT 2841 variety offers increased lysine content, appealing to health-conscious consumers. Rice suppliers are investing in new varieties, improved packaging, and multi-channel distribution to capture urban market share. This trend has increased value realization across the supply chain, benefiting farmers who meet quality standards.



The government mandate for grain fortification through the Public Distribution System (PDS) has established consistent demand. The program serves more than 800 million beneficiaries, with 1,023 fortified kernel plants having a capacity of 111 lakh metric tons, which is twice the scheme's requirements. The installation of blending equipment in over 21,000 rice mills has created an additional processing network that ensures steady operations for millers. The guaranteed annual procurement of 520 lakh metric tons provides stable demand for compliant suppliers. States with high anemia rates, such as Nagaland, demonstrate the public health need that supports continued budget allocation. The fortification requirements are projected to become standard specifications, encouraging open-market participants to produce nutrient-enriched products.

The Minimum Support Price (MSP) for paddy increased to INR 2,369 per quintal (USD 28.4) for 2025-26, maintaining the policy of ensuring 1.5 times the production cost. Government procurement increased from 761.40 lakh metric tons in 2014-15 to 1,062.69 lakh metric tons in 2022-23, increasing farmer earnings from INR 1.06 lakh crore (USD 12.8 billion) to INR 2.28 lakh crore (USD 27.5 billion). This price protection encourages farmers to adopt high-yield hybrid varieties without concerns of market oversupply, although the domestic price floor may reduce export competitiveness. The concentration of procurement in West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh, and Punjab creates regional income disparities and influences crop selection patterns in these regions.

India's agricultural mechanization rate of 40-45% indicates significant potential for improvement through precision planters, direct-seeded rice techniques, and laser-leveled irrigation systems. Research conducted across four states demonstrates that direct-seeded rice reduces cultivation costs by 79% and increases net earnings per acre by 62%. Remote-sensing data from Punjab indicates 20-40% water conservation without compromising crop yields, highlighting improved climate resilience. Government initiatives, including SMAM subsidies and an INR 500 crore (USD 60.2 million) genome-editing fund, support technology adoption, particularly through smallholder service platforms that consolidate demand. These improvements create a cycle of enhanced productivity that addresses increasing labor shortages.

Extreme precipitation events were observed during the 2024 monsoon, affecting agricultural fields in Gujarat, Andhra Pradesh, and Telangana. Analysis indicates that rainfall exceeding 1,621 mm negatively impacts Kharif crop yields. Climate projections indicate a potential 20% decline in irrigated crop yields in Uttar Pradesh, while rain-fed areas may experience slight improvements. Farmers are responding by adjusting planting schedules and adopting drought-resistant crop varieties, though infrastructure development for climate resilience remains inconsistent across regions.

Small landholdings averaging below 1.1 hectares restrict mechanization and increase per-unit input costs. Direct-seeded rice trials demonstrate yield improvements in Uttar Pradesh, while results vary in Madhya Pradesh due to diverse soil conditions. Hybrid seeds, despite offering 2-metric tons per hectare higher yields, cost 3-4 times more than open-pollinated varieties, making them less accessible to small farmers. Punjab's decision to ban hybrid paddy by 2025, following Food Corporation of India's quality concerns, highlights the challenge of balancing productivity gains with market requirements.

Geography Analysis

India's rice export strength originates from geographically concentrated surplus regions with established canal irrigation and policy support. Punjab and Haryana contribute over 70% of basmati exports, while Eastern states primarily supply non-basmati varieties to the Public Distribution System (PDS), creating distinct logistics channels. The India rice market benefited from the September 2024 policy change that resumed non-basmati exports, leading to increased freight bookings to West Africa and the Middle East.

Telangana leads the southern expansion through canal modernization and state input subsidies that support multiple cropping cycles. While eastern coastal zones maintain high productivity, port infrastructure limitations increase freight costs and reduce profit margins. Remote sensing data indicates 78% accuracy in identifying sustainable water-saving practices across 3 million Punjab plots, offering potential solutions for water-stressed regions across India.

Processing infrastructure aligns with raw-paddy production zones, with more than 21,000 fortification-compliant mills located in major procurement areas, strengthening regional advantages. Climate events, such as the 2024 floods, reveal infrastructure vulnerabilities, highlighting the importance of diverse sourcing within the India rice market. Export competitiveness varies based on distance to ports; Punjab basmati faces higher logistics costs compared to Pakistani exports through Karachi, compelling Indian exporters to focus on value-added branding to maintain price levels.

Risks & Concerns

There was default in repayment of bank loans from March-2018 onwards and the Banks classified the company's accounts as non-performing asset and served Notice under section 13(2) & 13(4) of The Securitization and Reconstruction of Financial Assets and Enforcement of Security Interest Act. The company entered into One Time Settlement (O.T.S.) agreement with the Banks and has paid full amount of O.T.S. along with Interest to the lenders.



The Lead Bank has filed petition against Company before Hon'ble NCLT Bench Chandigarh, As the company has paid in full the agreed One Time Settlement amount along with interest to the lenders, the petition filed under the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016 has become infructuous and has been disposed off.

One of the member Consortium Bank has filed petition against Company before Hon'ble NCLT Bench Chandigarh, As the company has paid in full the agreed One Time Settlement amount along with interest to the lenders, the petition filed under the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016 has become infructuous and has been disposed off.

The Company has received an ex-parte interim order from Debt Recovery Tribunal-III, Delhi dated 25/06/2020 restraining the company from transferring/ alienating or otherwise dealing with, or disposing off or encumbering or creating any third party interest with respect of the hypothecated assets/ immovable properties of the Company until further orders. As the company has paid in full the agreed One Time Settlement amount along with interest to the lenders, the petition filed has been withdrawn by the lender.

The Company has received a Notice through speed post from DRT-II, New Delhi. The Lead Bank has filed petition before DRT Delhi against the Company under section 19(4) of the Act. The company is contesting the matter. The company entered into One Time Settlement (O.T.S.) agreement with the Banks and has paid full amount of O.T.S. along with Interest to the lenders.

A summon/notice had been received from the Directorate of Enforcement, Central Regional Office, Government of India, in the name of The Director, to appear before them along with various document. The Director/authorized representative of the company has submitted relevant documents before the authorities/ offices / departments.

A notice had been received from Central Bureau of Investigation in the name of The Director, Kohinoor Foods Limited to produce documents/information in person before them. The Director/ authorized representative of the company submitted relevant documents before the authorities/ offices / departments.

The Company has submitted its resolution proposal (O.T.S.) with Consortium Banks and the same is sanctioned by the Lead Bank. The Company entered into O.T.S. with the Lead Bank/Lenders vide, dated 22//07/2021 and 21/12/2024 for the revised amount of INR 227.45 Crores. INR 27.45 Crores is to be paid by Sep-2025. As per the terms of the sanctioned O.T.S., the Company has paid INR 200 Crores (INR 190 Crores by the buyer of rice manufacturing unit and INR 10 Crores by the Company) (INR 78.5 Crores till 31/03/2025 and INR 121.50 Crores dated 15/04/2025). Further, INR 40.11 Crores of PNB-Dubai is outstanding, which is under consideration of O.T.S.

The company has demonetized its rice manufacturing unit; the buyer of the rice manufacturing unit has deposited full consideration amount of INR 190 Crore to the lenders and an additional piece of Land has been demonetized for Rs. 8 Crore to meet the outstanding with the lenders. The lender has issued NOC against rice manufacturing unit. The company has LREADY obtained approval from lender/shareholders in this regard. The Company has obtained NOC in majority from the lenders and remaining lenders would issue NOC to the company in due course. Further, the company is planning to operate the rice manufacturing unit (on lease basis) from Kandla Gujarat to sustain its rice business.

The company had issued a corporate guarantee in favor of PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) for loan granted by PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) to its wholly own subsidiary Kohinoor Foods USA Inc. PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) has invoked the corporate guarantee on default made by Kohinoor Foods USA Inc. The company has recognized the liability of Rs.4429.57 Lacs (previous year Rs.4088.18 Lacs). The Company has received legal notice from the Punjab National Bank, Hong Kong in regard to outstanding indebtedness of the due amount. The matter is now being taken up with PNB Dubai and the Company has submitted an OTS proposal for settlement of this liability arising out of corporate guarantee and requested to process the Company O.T.S. Proposal and forward the same to their Board/Head Office for approval, which is at present in consideration. The company has not provided interest towards revoked corporate guarantee for the loan given to its wholly owned subsidiary in USA by PNB Hongkong, to the extent of Rs 318.43 Lacs for the current year, Rs. 284.20 Lacs for the previous year and Rs. 1528.28 Lacs from the date of revocation of corporate guarantee up to 31-03-2026.

The Board of Trustee of the port of Mumbai has filed a money suit for recovery towards alleged outstanding demurrage charges against which the Company has filed its counter claim towards the financial losses, interest on the investment, refund of the license fees, refund of the demurrage charges, compensation and damages etc. The matter is still pending.

The company's vendor has filed an execution petition before Faridabad District & Session Judge. The company has also approached Hon'ble High Court Chandigarh and Hon'ble High Court Delhi for stay on above matter. Further, the Company filed a petition before the Hon'ble Apex Court with regard to contesting of proceeding before District and Session Court, Faridabad. The Hon'ble Apex Court had allowed the company petition with granting relief to the Company and parties against the impugned order of Faridabad District Court and asked the Company to approach the Hon'ble High Court for seeking direction for further relief. The Hon'ble high Court has granted stay. The Company has also deposited the impugned order amount in compliance with the order of the Court. The company is contesting the matter.



The Municipal Corporation has issued notice to the Builder of Pinnacle Tower for vacating of premises Pinnacle Tower, at Surajkund Faridabad. The Builder had obtained interim stay on the order of Municipal Commissioner, Faridabad from Hon'ble High Court Punjab and Haryana. The Company also filed a petition against Municipal Corporation & other before the Civil Judge, Senior Division, Faridabad with regard to stay of proceeding against order of Municipal Corporation, Faridabad. The Hon'ble Faridabad Court has stated that already interim stay has been granted by the Hon'ble High Court, hence no ground to grant relief prayed for is made out at this stage.

A Show Cause Notice under rule 4 of SEBI (Procedure for Holding Inquiry and Imposing Penalties) Rules, 1995 has been issued in the name of Directors and Company. The Directors and Company have already applied for settlement and adjudication applications with SEBI.

The observations of the Auditor with regard to the management assessment of (a) the Company's ability to continue as going concern in view of the continuous operational loss and negative net worth and due to financial constraint, material uncertainty exists about the company's ability to continue as going concern. The management of the Company believes that it can continue as a going concern, based on the sanction of revised / revival of one time settlement by the lenders, which has been fully paid by the company and the interest shown by Prospective Investors in the Company and (b) the company has not provided interest towards revoked corporate guarantee for the loan given to its wholly owned subsidiary in USA by PNB Hongkong, to the extent of Rs 318.43 Lacs for the current year, Rs. 284.20 Lacs for the previous year and Rs. 1528.28 Lacs from the date of revocation of corporate guarantee up to 31-03-2026. The matter is now being taken up with PNB Dubai and the Company has submitted an OTS proposal for settlement of this liability arising out of corporate guarantee and requested to process the Company O.T.S. Proposal and forward the same to their Board/Head Office for approval, which is at present in consideration.

Macro-economic factors like recession, subdued demand and political uncertainty may affect the business of the Company and the industry at large as well. The Company is aware that uncertainties in business offer opportunities as well as downside risks and thus has identified and put in place mitigation tools for the same. Some key risk areas are:

Procurement risk

In a country like India, where more than 60 per cent of the area under cultivation is not irrigated, farm production is highly vulnerable to fluctuations in rainfall. Beside production risk, Indian farmers also face high market risk. Farm harvest prices in the country show high inter and intra year volatility. Price variation is quite pronounced in the regions and commodities

where price support mechanism is not operative. Further adequate availability of key raw materials at the right prices is crucial for the Company. Being a generic natural product with low yield concentrated in a small region of the World, production of Basmati depends on the vagaries of nature. Therefore, any disruption in the supply due to a natural or other calamity or violent changes in the cost structure could adversely affect the Company's ability to reach its consumers with the right value proposition. However, we are ready with plans that might help us at such times. However, the Company's long-term relationship with farmers built on trust ensures constant supply and thus over the years it has not faced any procurement problems. Also, adequacy of irrigation facilities in the Basmati producing regions mitigates these uncertainties.

High working capital requirement: Basmati rice requires to be aged for 9-12 months before selling, leading to huge working capital requirements. This results in low ROCE for the industry. Combating this risk, efficient working capital management system has been set in place by the Company and cash flow is monitored on daily basis.

Intense competition from unorganized sector: Another characteristic of this industry is the presence of unorganized sector offering basmati in loose unbranded form which intensifies competition. The Company is moving towards branded products and has invested significantly in building a strong brand which helps in differentiating their product.

Auditors' Report

The Company has received the Auditors Report signed by M/s N C Raj & Associates, Chartered Accountants, New Delhi and took note on the same. Further as mentioned in the Auditors Report, attention is drawn (Emphasis of Matters) to notes to the Financial Statements, the same has not been reproduced for the sake of brevity as the remarks given by the Auditors are self-explanatory, however the Board has discussed the same in detail as had been provided in the notes to the Financial Statements and The observations of the Auditor with regard to the management assessment in brief as below:

- (b) the company has not provided interest towards revoked corporate guarantee for the loan given to its wholly owned subsidiary in USA by PNB Hongkong, to the extent of Rs 318.43 Lacs for the current year, Rs. 284.20 Lacs for the previous year and Rs. 1528.28 Lacs from the date of revocation of corporate guarantee up to 31-03-2026. The matter is now being taken up with PNB Dubai and the Company has submitted an OTS proposal for settlement of this liability arising out of corporate guarantee and requested to process the Company O.T.S. Proposal and forward the same to their Board/Head Office for approval, which is at present in consideration.

There are no instances of any fraud reported by the Statutory Auditors to the Audit Committee or the Board pursuant to section 143(12) of the Act.

- a) As per the advice received from legal experts and on the basis of merit of the case, there is a high probability that the aforesaid impugned orders will be set aside, and the demand will be deleted. Accordingly, management is of the view that no provision in respect of the above demands is required to be made in the books of accounts.
- b) For assessment year 2016-17, the Assessing Officer has vide its appeal effect order dated 10-01-2026, and following the direction given by ITAT (Delhi) has deleted the demand and has passed the order at NIL. However, the appeal against the penalty order dated 13-03-2024 is still pending with CIT (Appeals). As the original demand has been removed entirely, as a consequential effect the penalty will also be removed.
- c) The company has filed an appeal before CIT (Appeals) on 13 -04-2026 against the order of A.O. for AY 2017-18 against the demand of RS. 16,42,49,200.

- III. Appeals are lying pending before the Dy. Excise & Taxation Commissioner-Appeal, Punjab against the Order received from Excise and Taxation Dept., Punjab

in respect of Year 2009-10 and 2010-11 demanding a sum of Rs.4,50,41,414/- towards the cess imposed by the State Govt. on exports. The company has challenged the validity of imposition of cess on export in its appeal as the same is not permissible under article 286 of the Constitution of India. Further demand has been raised for Rs. 5,41,073/- after completing the Sales Tax assessment for AY 2011-12 against which appeal has been filed.

- IV. There was default in repayment of bank loans from March-2018 onwards and the Banks classified the company's accounts as non-performing asset and served Notice under section 13(2) & 13(4) of The Securitization and Reconstruction of Financial Assets and Enforcement of Security Interest Act. The company entered into One Time Settlement (O.T.S.) agreement with the Banks and has paid full amount of O.T.S. along with Interest to the lenders.

The Lead Bank has filed petition against Company before Hon'ble NCLT Bench Chandigarh, As the company has paid in full the agreed One Time Settlement amount along with interest to the lenders, the petition filed under the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016 has become infructuous and has been disposed off.

One of the member Consortium Bank has filed petition against Company before Hon'ble NCLT Bench Chandigarh, As the company has paid in full the agreed One Time Settlement amount along with interest to the lenders, the petition filed under the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016 has become infructuous and has been disposed off.

The Company has received an ex-parte interim order from Debt Recovery Tribunal-III, Delhi dated 25/06/2020 restraining the company from transferring/ alienating or otherwise dealing with, or disposing off or encumbering or creating any third party interest with respect of the hypothecated assets/ immovable properties of the Company until further orders. As the company has paid in full the agreed One Time Settlement amount along with interest to the lenders, the petition filed has been withdrawn by the lender.

The Company has received a Notice through speed post from DRT-II, New Delhi. The Lead Bank has filed petition before DRT Delhi against the Company under section 19(4) of the Act. The company is contesting the matter. The company entered into One Time Settlement (O.T.S.) agreement with the Banks and has paid full amount of O.T.S. along with Interest to the lenders.



A summon/notice had been received from the Directorate of Enforcement, Central Regional Office, Government of India, in the name of The Director, to appear before them along with various document. The Director/authorized representative of the company has submitted relevant documents before the authorities/ offices / departments.

A notice had been received from Central Bureau of Investigation in the name of The Director, Kohinoor Foods Limited to produce documents/information in person before them. The Director/ authorized representative of the company submitted relevant documents before the authorities/ offices / departments.

The Company has submitted its resolution proposal (O.T.S.) with Consortium Banks and the same is sanctioned by the Lead Bank. The Company entered into O.T.S. with the Lead Bank/Lenders vide, dated 22//07/2021 and 21/12/2024 for the revised amount of INR 227.45 Crores. INR 27.45 Crores is to be paid by Sep-2025. As per the terms of the sanctioned O.T.S., the Company has paid INR 200 Crores (INR 190 Crores by the buyer of rice manufacturing unit and INR 10 Crores by the Company) (INR 78.5 Crores till 31/03/2025 and INR 121.50 Crores dated 15/04/2025). Further, INR 40.11 Crores of PNB-Dubai is outstanding, which is under consideration of O.T.S. The company has demonetized its rice manufacturing unit; the buyer of the rice manufacturing unit has deposited full consideration amount of INR 190 Crore to the lenders and an additional piece of Land has been demonetized for Rs. 8 Crore to meet the outstanding with the lenders. The lender has issued NOC against rice manufacturing unit. The company has LREADY obtained approval from lender/shareholders in this regard. The Company has obtained NOC in majority from the lenders and remaining lenders would issue NOC to the company in due course. Further, the company is planning to operate the rice manufacturing unit (on lease basis) from Kandla Gujarat to sustain its rice business.

The company had issued a corporate guarantee in favor of PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) for loan granted by PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) to its wholly own subsidiary Kohinoor Foods USA Inc. PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) has invoked the corporate guarantee on default made by Kohinoor Foods USA Inc. The company has recognized the liability of Rs.4429.57 Lacs (previous year Rs.4088.18 Lacs). The Company has received legal notice from the Punjab National Bank, Hong Kong in regard to outstanding indebtedness of the due amount. The matter is now being taken up with PNB Dubai and the Company has submitted an OTS proposal for settlement of this liability arising out of corporate guarantee and requested to process the Company O.T.S. Proposal and forward the same to their Board/Head Office for approval, which is at present in consideration. The company has not provided interest towards revoked corporate guarantee for the loan given to its wholly

owned subsidiary in USA by PNB Hongkong, to the extent of Rs 318.43 Lacs for the current year, Rs. 284.20 Lacs for the previous year and Rs. 1528.28 Lacs from the date of revocation of corporate guarantee up to 31-03-2026.

The Board of Trustee of the port of Mumbai has filed a money suit for recovery towards alleged outstanding demurrage charges against which the Company has filed its counter claim towards the financial losses, interest on the investment, refund of the license fees, refund of the demurrage charges, compensation and damages etc. The matter is still pending.

The company's vendor has filed an execution petition before Faridabad District & Session Judge. The company has also approached Hon'ble High Court Chandigarh and Hon'ble High Court Delhi for stay on above matter. Further, the Company filed a petition before the Hon'ble Apex Court with regard to contesting of proceeding before District and Session Court, Faridabad. The Hon'ble Apex Court had allowed the company petition with granting relief to the Company and parties against the impugned order of Faridabad District Court and asked the Company to approach the Hon'ble High Court for seeking direction for further relief. The Hon'ble high Court has granted stay. The Company has also deposited the impugned order amount in compliance with the order of the Court. The company is contesting the matter.

The Municipal Corporation has issued notice to the Builder of Pinnacle Tower for vacating of premises Pinnacle Tower, at Surajkund Faridabad. The Builder had obtained interim stay on the order of Municipal Commissioner, Faridabad from Hon'ble High Court Punjab and Haryana. The Company also filed a petition against Municipal Corporation & other before the Civil Judge, Senior Division, Faridabad with regard to stay of proceeding against order of Municipal Corporation, Faridabad. The Hon'ble Faridabad Court has stated that already interim stay has been granted by the Hon'ble High Court, hence no ground to grant relief prayed for is made out at this stage.

A Show Cause Notice under rule 4 of SEBI (Procedure for Holding Inquiry and Imposing Penalties) Rules, 1995 has been issued in the name of Directors and Company. The Directors and Company have already applied for settlement and adjudication applications with SEBI.

In the opinion of the Board, there has been no change in the circumstances which may affect their status as Independent Directors of the Company and the Board is satisfied of the integrity, expertise and experience (including proficiency, in term of Section 150(1) of the Act and applicable rules thereunder) of all Independent Directors on the Board.

Training of Independent Directors

The Company Secretary of the Company conducted a detailed training programme to provide/update the changes in the SEBI (LODR), Regulation, 2015/Companies Act, 2013 and other relevant act to the Independent Directors.

Difference in valuation in the case of One Time Settlement of Loan from Bank or Financial Institution

The one time settlement was sanctioned by the lenders of the Company in the year 2021. The Company had already offered the one time settlement proposal more than the valuation of the properties of the company. Further due to unforeseen circumstances, the terms of the one time settlement could not be met. The company placed improved one time settlement proposal with the Lenders. The Lead Consortium Lender upon review, agreed to revive the one time settlement of the Company on 24.12.2024.

The brief of the revival of the OTS proposal is as follows:

- Rs. 227.45 Crores plus future delayed period interest @ MCLR (1yr) +2% w.e.f, 01.10.2024 till final payment of OTS amount not later than 6 months from the approval of OTS by all lenders.



- The upfront amount of Rs. 25 Crore will be appropriated immediately upon conveying of sanction of OTS to the borrower;
- Rs. 175 Crore to be deposited on or before 31.12.2024;
- Balance OTS amount of Rs. 27.45 Cr. plus future delayed period interest @ MCLR (1 Yr) +2% w.e.f. 01.10.24 till payment of entire OTS amount but not later than 6 months from the approval of OTS by all lenders;
- On receipt of Rs. 190 Cr. consortium to release IP along with plant & machinery situated at Murthal;
- Members Bank will issue NOC to PNB after getting their entire share of OTS amount along with delayed period interest. Thereafter PNB will issue combined NOC to the borrower after getting its share in OTS with delayed period interest;
- Charge on other IPs mortgaged with Bank will be released only on receipt OTS amount along with delayed period interest plus adjustment of PNB account at PNB Dubai. Accordingly, No Dues Certificate will be issued.

The company submitted one time settlement (OTS) resolution which was sanctioned for an amount of INR 227.45 Crores by the consortium lenders, during the last year. The company had partly paid the OTS amount last year and fully paid the balance amount alongwith interest during the current year. The company has obtained NOC from the majority lenders and is in process of obtaining the balance NOC from the remaining lender along with consolidated NOC from the lead bank in terms of the sanctioned one time settlement.

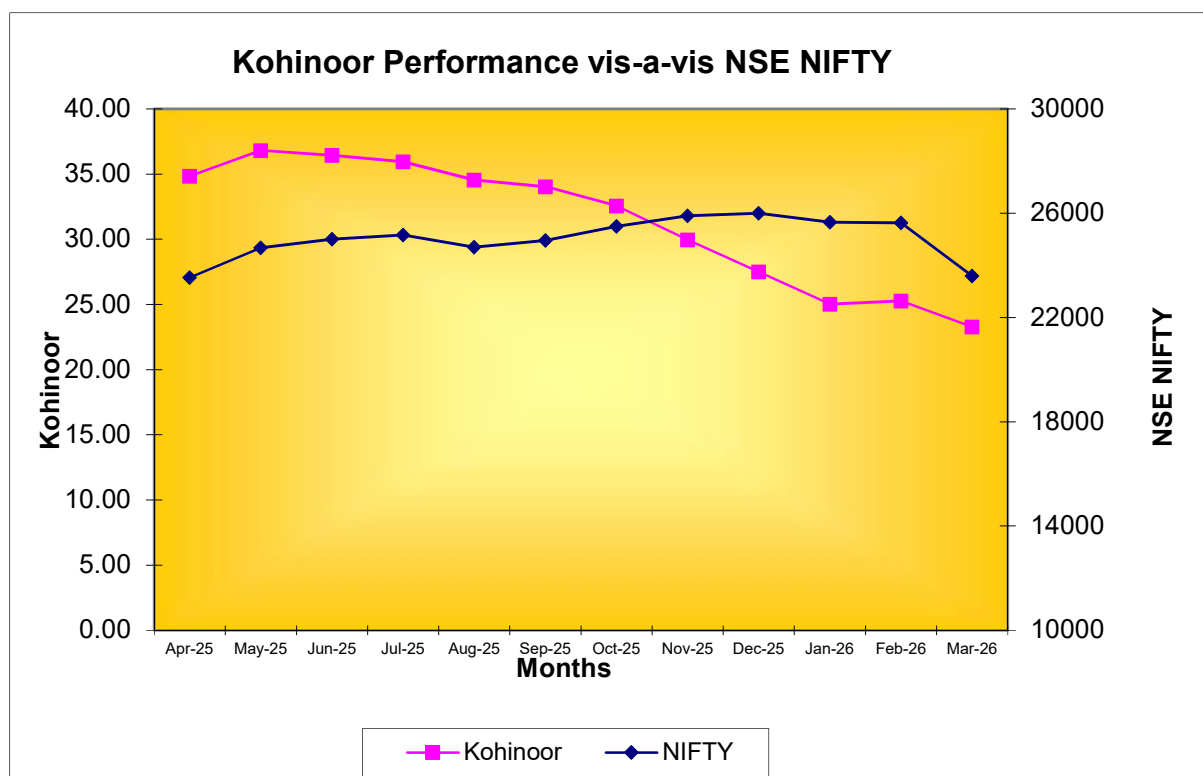
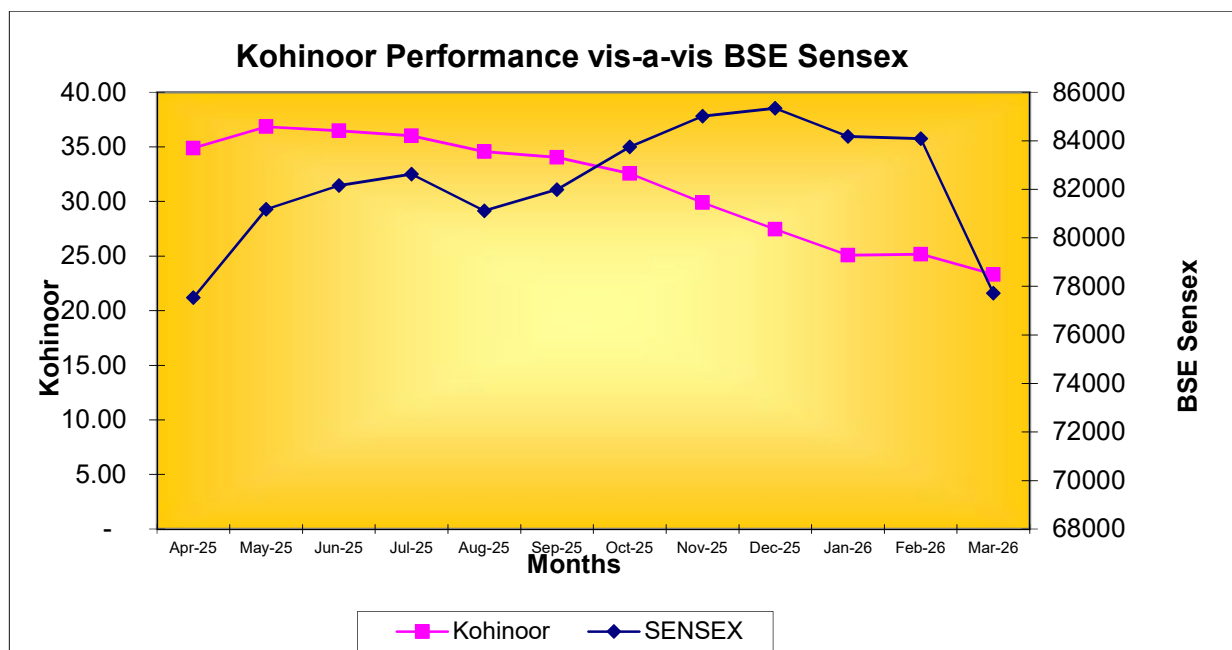

TO THE MEMBERS OF

KOHINOOR FOODS LIMITED

Qualified Opinion.

We have audited the accompanying **Standalone** financial statements of Kohinoor Foods Limited ("the Company"), which comprise the Standalone Balance Sheet as at March 31st, 2026, the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss (including Other Comprehensive Income), the Standalone Cash Flow Statement and the standalone Statement of Changes in equity for the year ended, and a summary of the significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, **except for the effects/possible effects of the matters described in paragraph under 'Basis for Qualified Opinion'**, the aforesaid standalone financial statements give the information required by the Act in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India including the Ind AS, of the financial position of the Company as at March 31st, 2026, and its standalone profit/loss including other comprehensive income, its standalone cash flows and the changes in equity for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Qualified opinion

1. In reference to **Note No. 40** in the statement discloses the management's assessment of the company's ability to continue as going concern, the assessment is based on the sanction of revised / revival of One time settlement by the lead bank, which has been fully paid by the company. However, in view of continuous operational losses, and negative net worth and due to financial constraints, material uncertainty exists about the company's ability to continue as going concern and the decision of the management of the company to prepare the accounts of the company on going concern basis. There may arise a need to adjust the realizable value of assets and liabilities in the event of failure of assumption as to going concern.
2. As stated in **Note No.26** of Standalone Audited Financial Results, the company has not provided interest towards revoked corporate guarantee for the loan given to its wholly owned subsidiary in USA by PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai), to the extent of Rs 318.42 lacs for the current year, Rs. 284.20 lacs for the previous year and Rs. 1528.27 lacs from the date of revocation of corporate guarantee up to 31-03-2026. Further no provision has been made towards penal interest, penalties, any other Debit or Credit etc. as may be done by lenders. In the absence of reconciliation and complete statement of account from the banks, the above amount has been arrived as per calculation made by the company. With the limited information the aggregate amount un-provided in books of account of the company is not ascertainable with accuracy.

Emphasis of Matters

We draw your attention to the following matters in the Notes to the financial statements:

- (1) The company has not made Provision for the demand raised by various authorities (Such as Income Tax, Vat etc.) as the matters are pending before various appellate forums. We are unable to comment upon possible impact of non-provision in the standalone financial statement for the year ended 31st March 2026.
- (2) In reference to **Note no. 15(C)(i)** to the standalone financial statement the Banks have classified the company's accounts as non-Performing asset and served recall Notice under section 13(2) & 13(4) of The Securitization and Reconstruction of Financial Assets and Enforcement of Security Interest Act, 2002. The company entered into OTS agreement with the Banks and has paid full amount of OTS along with Interest to the lenders.
- (3) In reference to **Note no. 15(C)(ii)** to the standalone financial statement the Company had received Notices from the Banks under section 13(2) of The Securitization and Reconstruction of Financial Assets and Enforcement of Security Interest Act, 2002, in the month of July, 2018 to May, 2019 and in the month of February 2020 to September 2020. The Company had replied to the notices received from the Bank within 60 days from the date of notices. The Company had also received Notices from the Banks under section 13(4) of The Securitization and Reconstruction of Financial Assets and Enforcement of Security Interest Act, 2002. However the company entered into OTS agreement with the Banks and has paid full amount of OTS along with Interest to the lenders.
- (4) We draw attention to **Note No. 15(C)(iii)** of the statement of the company, The lead banker, Punjab National Bank had filed petition under Section 7 of Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016, before the Honbl'e court of NCLT, Chandigarh Bench. As the company has paid in full the agreed One time settlement amount along with interest to the lenders, the petition filed under Section 7 of Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016 has become infructuous and has been disposed off.



- (5) In reference to **Note no. 15(C)(iv)**, The Secured Creditors (IDBI Bank) of the Company had filed petition under Section 7 of Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016, before the Hon'ble court of NCLT, Chandigarh Bench. As the company has paid in full the agreed One time settlement amount along with interest to the lenders, the petition filed under Section 7 of Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016 has become infructuous and has been disposed off.
- (6) **Note no. 15(C)(v)** of the financial result stating that The company had received Ex-parte Interim Order dated 25-06-2020 from Debt Recovery Tribunal-III, Delhi in the matter of ICICI Bank Vs. Kohinoor Foods Limited restraining the company from transferring/ alienating or otherwise dealing with, or disposing off or encumbering or creating any third party interest with respect of the hypothecated assets/immovable properties of Company until further orders. The company is contesting the matter and taking necessary action. It has paid in full the agreed One time settlement amount along with interest to the lenders.
- (7) **Note no. 15(C)(vi)** of the financial result stating that The Lead Bank had filed petition before DRT Delhi under section 19(4) of the Act. The Company is contesting the matter. It has paid in full the agreed One time settlement amount along with interest to the lenders.
- (8) In reference to **Note no. 15 (d)**, The company had issued a corporate guarantee in Favor of PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) for loan granted by PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) to its wholly own subsidiary Kohinoor Foods USA Inc. PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) has invoked the corporate guarantee on default made by Kohinoor Foods USA Inc. The company has recognised the liability of Rs.442957168 /- (previous year Rs.40,88,17,668 /-). The Company has received legal notice from the PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) in regard to outstanding indebtedness of the due amount. The matter is now being taken up with PNB Dubai and the Company has submitted an OTS proposal for settlement of this liability arising out of corporate guarantee.
- (9) We draw attention to **Note No. 15(e)** of the statement of the company, The Company submitted one time settlement (OTS) resolution plan which was sanctioned for an amount of INR 227.45 crores by the consortium Lenders, during the last year. The company had partly paid the OTS amount last year and has fully paid the balance amount along with interest during the current year. The Company has obtained NOC from 4 out of 6 lenders and is in process of Obtaining remaining NOC from the Lenders along with Consolidated NOC from the Lead Bank in terms of the sanctioned One Time Settlement.
- (10) In reference to **Note no. 27 (b)**, During the year the company has written off some balances which are not recoverable and written back some balances which are not payable.
- (11) We draw attention to **Note No. 28** of the statement of the company, During the year the company has sold its Rice Plant situated at Murthal Sonipat, Haryana for a consideration of Rs. 190 Crores and an additional piece of Land for Rs. 8 Crore, out of which Rs. 173 Crores is for Land & Building and Rs. 25 Crores for Machinery. Out of consideration of Rs. 173 crores for land and building, the sale deed of Rs. 82,35,10,345 has been registered till 31 March 2026 and another sale deed of Rs. 80,00,00,000 was registered in May 2026. Balance land parcel of the value of Rs. 10,64,89,655 has not yet been registered. However the company has recognized the sale proceeds and the resulting gain on the entire plant as the possession and control has been transferred to the buyer and the consideration has been received.

During the previous financial year, based on the One Time Settlement by the Lender Banks, the OTS proposal amount was Rs 227.45 crores, the company had paid substantial amount of Rs 200 crores up to 15-04-2025, The, Exceptional items of Rs 382,74,23,474 during previous year is on account of Gain on OTS.
- (12) In the reference to **Note no. 29**, Income tax Expenses for Prior year amounting to Rs. 547.31 lacs pertain to tax demand of previous years. The company had deposited tax in earlier years which have been adjusted by the Tax authorities against such demand.
- (13) In the reference to **Note no. 30(a)**, There was an error in allocation of Revaluation surplus amount different parts of land at Amritsar, a part of which has been sold in earlier year. The previous year profit on sale of assets, Property Plant & Equipment, Revaluation Reserve and General Reserve have been adjusted and previous year figures have been restated accordingly.
- (14) In the reference to **Note no. 30(b)**, The company has entered into OTS with the Lenders, and has paid full amount of OTS during the year. It has also paid interest on delayed payment of OTS amount in full. The interest paid by the company during the year includes Rs. 844.87 lacs pertaining to period from 01-10-2024 to 31.03.2025 which was not provided for in previous year, as the there was a difference of opinion with the banks on interest calculation, which was resolved subsequently. This has been treated as prior period expense and the previous year's interest expense, interest liability and general reserve have been restated.



- (15) In reference to **Note no. 37(C)(vi)(a)**, The Board of Trustee of the port of Mumbai has filed a money suit for recovery of Rs. 963 lacs towards alleged outstanding demurrage charges against which the company has filed its counter claim of Rs. 1088 lacs towards the financial losses, interest on the investment, refund of the license fees, refund of the demurrage charges, compensation and damages etc. The matter is still pending.
- (16) In reference to **Note no. 37(C)(vi)(b)**, The Municipal Corporation has issued notice to the Builder of Pinnacle Tower for vacating of premises Pinnacle Tower, at Surajkund Faridabad. The Builder obtained interim stay on the order of Municipal Commissioner, Faridabad from Hon'ble High Court Punjab and Haryana. The Company also filed a petition before the civil judge, senior division, Faridabad with regard to stay of proceeding against order of Municipal Corporation, Faridabad. The Hon'ble Faridabad Court has stated that already interim stay have been granted by the Hon'ble High Court, hence no ground to grant relief prayed for is made out at this stage.
- (17) In reference to **Note no. 37(C)(vi)(c)**, The company's vendor has filed an execution petition before Faridabad District & Session Judge. The company has also approached Hon'ble High Court Chandigarh and Hon'ble High Court Delhi for stay on above matter. Further, the Company filed a petition before the Hon'ble Apex Court with regard to contesting of proceeding before District and Session Court, Faridabad. The Hon'ble Apex Court had allowed the company petition with granting relief to the Company and parties against the impugned order of Faridabad District Court and asked the Company to approach the Hon'ble High Court for seeking direction for further relief. The Company has also deposited the impugned order amount in compliance with the order of the Court. The company is contesting the matter.
- (18) In reference to **Note no. 37(C)(vi)(d)**, A Show Cause Notice under rule 4 of SEBI (Procedure for Holding Inquiry and Imposing Penalties) Rules, 1995 has been issued in the name of Directors and Company. The Directors and Company have already applied for settlement and adjudication application with SEBI.
- (19) In reference to **Note no.43** of the statement which explains the management's assessment of impairment of assets. As per the assessment of the management, the recoverable amount of assets is higher than it carrying value and hence no impairment of assets needs to be recorded in the financial statements.
- (20) In reference to **Note No.47**, balances of some debtors and creditors are subject to their confirmations.
- (21) In reference to **Note no. 48** corresponding figures for the previous year have been regrouped/rearranged, wherever necessary to confirm to current year classification.

Our opinion is not modified in respect of these matters.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. In addition, the matters described in the "basis for qualified opinion" and "emphasis of matter" paragraph are by their nature are key audit matters.

Responsibility of Management's and Those Charged with Governance for the Standalone Financial Statements

The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the matters stated in Section 134 (5) of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") with respect to the preparation of these standalone Ind AS financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance including other comprehensive income, cash flows and changes in equity of the Company in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) prescribed under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended, and other accounting principles generally accepted in India. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding the assets of the Company and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate implementation and maintenance of accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the Ind AS financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statement, management is responsible for assessing the company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as application, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Thus, board of directors are also responsible for overseeing the company's financial reporting process.



Auditor's Responsibility

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with SAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

According to information and explanations given to us and based on our audit, the following material weakness has been identified as at 31st March, 2026.

1. The Company did not have an appropriate internal control system for
 - (a) Customer acceptance;
 - (b) Customer credit evaluation;
 - (c) Establishing customer credit limit for sales;
 - (d) Acceptance of goods by customers and transfer of risk & reward at the time of sales.

This could potentially result in the company recognising revenue without establishing reasonable certainty of ultimate collection.

2. The Company did not have any internal control system for follow-up/recovery/adjustment of old outstanding receivables and payables including balance confirmation and reconciliation.

A 'Material weakness' is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiency, in internal financial control over financial reporting, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the company's annual financial statement will not be prevented or detected on timely basis.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effects/possible effects of basis of qualified opinion, the holding Company has maintained, in all material respects, adequate internal financial controls system over financial reporting and such internal financial controls over financial reporting were operating effectively as at 31st March, 2026, based on the internal control over financial reporting criteria established by the Company considering the essential components of internal control stated in the Guidance Note on Audit of Internal Financial Controls Over Financial Reporting issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

We have considered the material weaknesses identified and reported above in determining the nature, timing and extent of audit tests applied in our audit of the March 31, 2026 standalone financial statements of the group and these material weaknesses does not affect our opinion on the standalone financial statements of the company.

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE STANDALONE FINANCIAL STATEMENT

1. Company Information

Kohinoor Foods Limited was incorporated in 1989. It is a Public Limited company listed on the stock exchanges, BSE and NSE. The Company is a leading Basmati Rice player. It also owns a Food Factory situated at Bahalgarh, Sonapat. The products of the company are known for superior quality and are popular worldwide.

The company has two 100% wholly owned subsidiaries – Sachdeva Brothers Private Limited, in India and Kohinoor Foods USA Inc in USA.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Preparation

These Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (hereinafter referred to as the 'Ind AS') as notified by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2016. The financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2018 were prepared by the company under Ind AS for the first time, with 01-04-2016 as date of transition.

The Financial Statements have been prepared on the historical cost convention on going concern basis and on accruals basis unless otherwise stated. The accounting policies are applied consistently to all the periods presented in the financial statements.

(b) Use of Estimates and Judgments

The preparation of Financial Statements requires management to make certain assumptions and estimates that affect the reported amount, the Financial Statements and Notes thereto. Difference between actual results and estimates are recognized in the period in which they materialize.

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

The Company has adopted revaluation model for land & building. All the assets belonging to these classes of assets are carried at revalued amount being its fair value at the date of revaluation less subsequent depreciation. The Company shall carry out the revaluation of these assets periodically after every 3 to 5 years.

Property, Plant & Equipment under all other classes are stated at cost of acquisition/installation inclusive of freight, duties, and taxes and all incidental expenses and net of accumulated depreciation. In respect of major projects involving construction, related pre-operational expenses form part of the value of assets capitalized. Expenses capitalized also include applicable borrowing costs. Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost can be measured reliably.

Property, plant and equipment which are not ready for intended use as on the date of Balance Sheet are disclosed as "Capital work-in-progress" and stated at the amount spent up to the date of balance sheet.

Intangible assets are stated at their cost of acquisition.

(d) Depreciation

Depreciation on Property, Plant & Equipment is provided on written down value method, in terms of useful life of the Assets as prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act 2013. The depreciation rates which are different from the principal rates specified in Schedule-II are as follows: -

Tarpaulin	100% p.a.
Wooden & Plastic Crates	100% p.a.



(e) Financial Instruments

(1) Financial Assets

Initial recognition and measurement

All financial assets are initially recognized at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities, which are not at fair value through profit or loss, are adjusted to the fair value on initial recognition.

Subsequent measurement

i) Financial assets carried at amortized cost

A financial asset is measured at amortized cost if it is held within a business model whose objective is to hold the asset in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

ii) Financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)

A financial asset is measured at FVTOCI if it is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

iii) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)

A financial asset which is not classified in any of the above categories are measured at FVTPL.

Investment in Subsidiaries, Associates and Joint Ventures

The Company has accounted for its investments in Subsidiaries, Associates and Joint Venture at cost, subject to impairment loss if any.

Other Equity Investments

All other equity investments are measured at fair value. Investments which are not held for trading purposes and where the Company has exercised the option to classify the investment as Fair Value through other comprehensive income ('FVTOCI'), all fair value changes on the investment are recognised in OCI.

(2) Financial liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

All financial liabilities are recognized at fair value and in case of loans, net of directly attributable cost. Fees of recurring nature are directly recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss as finance cost.

Subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities are carried at amortized cost using the effective interest method. For trade and other payables maturing within one year from the Balance Sheet date, the carrying amounts approximate fair value due to the short maturity of these instruments.

(3) Derivative financial instruments

Derivative financial instruments such as forward contracts, option contracts and cross currency swaps, to hedge its foreign currency risks are initially recognized at fair value on the date a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently remeasured at their fair value with changes in fair value recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period when they arise.

(f) Fair value measurement

The Company classifies the fair value of its financial instruments, FVTPL and FVTOCI, in the following hierarchy, based on the inputs used in their valuation



- i) Level 1 - The fair value of financial instruments quoted in active markets is based on their quoted closing price at the balance sheet date.
- ii) Level 2 - The fair value of financial instruments that are not traded in an active market is determined by using valuation techniques using observable market data. Such valuation techniques include discounted cash flows, standard valuation models based on market parameters for interest rates, yield curves or foreign exchange rates, dealer quotes for similar instruments and use of comparable arm's length transactions.
- iii) Level 3 - The fair value of financial instruments that are measured on the basis of entity specific valuations using inputs that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

(g) Dividend to Equity Shareholders

Dividend to Equity Shareholders is recognized as a liability and deducted from shareholders' equity, in the period in which the dividends are approved by the equity shareholders in the general meeting.

(h) Inventories

Raw materials, traded and finished goods are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Stores and spares are carried at cost.

Cost is determined on FIFO (First in First out) basis for raw material, and on weighted average method for all other categories of inventories. Cost comprises expenditure incurred in the normal course of business in bringing such inventories to its present location and condition, where applicable, include appropriate overheads based on normal level of activity.

(i) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

(j) Revenue Recognition

Revenue is measured at fair value of the consideration received or receivable, net of discount, rebate, returns and value added taxes. The Company recognizes revenue when the amount of revenue can be reliably measured; when it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the entity; and when specific criteria have been met for each of the Company activities.

Revenue from sale of goods is recognized when all the significant risk and rewards of ownership in the goods are transferred to the buyer as per the terms of the contract, there is no continuing managerial involvement with the goods and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably. On recognition of revenue the Company retains no effective control of the goods transferred to a degree usually associated with ownership and no significant uncertainty exists regarding the amount of the consideration that will be derived from the sale of goods.

Interest income is recognized using the effective interest method. Revenue in respect of Insurance / others claims, Commission, etc. is recognized only when it is reasonably certain that the ultimate collection will be made.

Revenue in respect of sale of licenses, duty drawback and other incentives is recognized on realization basis.

(k) Research and Development

Research expenditure is recognized in the statement of profit and loss as incurred. Development expenditure is capitalized only if the costs can be reliably measured, future economic benefits are probable, the product is technically feasible and the Company has the intent and the resources to complete the project. Development assets are amortized based on the estimated useful life, as appropriate.

(l) Employee Benefits

Contributions to defined provident fund are charged to the statement of profit and loss on accrual basis. Present liability for future payment of gratuity is determined on the basis of actuarial valuation at the balance sheet date and the expenses is charged to the statement of profit and loss.



(m) Foreign Currency Transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are recognized at the prevailing exchange rates on the transaction dates. Realized gains and losses on settlement of foreign currency transactions are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Monetary foreign currency assets and liabilities at the year-end are translated at the year-end exchange rates and the resultant exchange differences are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in a foreign currency and measured at historical cost are translated at the exchange rate prevalent at the date of transaction.

(n) Borrowing Costs

Borrowing costs consist of interest, ancillary and other costs that the Company incurs in connection with the borrowing of funds and interest relating to other financial liabilities. Borrowing costs also include exchange differences to the extent regarded as an adjustment to the borrowing costs.

Interest and other borrowing costs attributable to qualifying assets are capitalized as a part of such assets till such time the assets are ready for use. Other interest and borrowing costs are charged to Statement of Profit and Loss.

(p) Income tax

Current Income Tax:

Current Income Tax is measured at the amount expected to be paid to the tax authorities in accordance with Income Tax Act, 1961.

Deferred Tax:

Deferred tax is provided using the balance sheet approach on temporary differences between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes at the reporting date. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the tax are those that are enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilized.

Current and Deferred tax is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognized in other comprehensive income or directly in equity. In this case, the tax is also recognized in other comprehensive income or directly in equity

Minimum Alternate Tax:

According to section 115JAA of the Income Tax Act, 1961, Minimum Alternative Tax ('MAT') paid over and above the normal income tax in a subject year is eligible for carry forward for fifteen succeeding assessment years for set-off against normal income tax liability. The MAT credit asset is assessed against the Company's normal income tax during the specified period.

(q) Leases

At the date of commencement of the lease, the Company recognizes a right-of-use (ROU) asset and a corresponding lease liability for all lease arrangements in which it is a lessee, except for leases with a term of 12 months or less (short term leases) and low value leases. For these short-term and low-value leases, the Company recognizes the lease payments as an operating expense on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

The ROU assets are initially recognized at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or prior to the commencement date of the lease plus any initial direct costs less any lease incentives. They are subsequently measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. ROU assets are depreciated from the commencement date on a straight line basis over the shorter of the lease term and useful life of the underlying asset.

The lease liability is initially measured at amortized cost at the present value of the future lease payments. The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease.



(r) Provisions, Contingent Liability and Contingent Assets

The Company creates a provision when there is a present obligation as a result of past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of obligation. A disclosure of contingent liability is made when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that will probably not require outflow of resources or where a reliable estimate of the obligation cannot be made. Contingent Assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the Financial Statements.

(s) Impairment of Financial Assets

Expected credit losses are recognized for all financial assets subsequent to initial recognition other than financials assets in FVTPL category.

(t) Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

The Company assesses at each Balance Sheet date whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such Indication exists; the Company estimates the recoverable amount of assets. If such recoverable amount of the assets or the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the assets belong is less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount is reduced to its recoverable amount. The reduction is treated as an impairment loss and is recognized in the statement of Profit & Loss. If at the Balance Sheet date there is an indication that if a previously assessed impairment loss no longer exists, the recoverable amount is reassessed and the assets is reflected at recoverable amount.

(u) Exceptional Items

Exceptional items are disclosed separately in the financial statements where it is necessary to do so to provide further understanding of the financial performance of the company. These are material items of income or expense that have to be shown separately due to their nature or incidence.

(v) Earnings per share

The Company presents basic and diluted earnings per share data for its ordinary shares. Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholders of the Company by the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the year. Diluted earnings per share is determined by adjusting the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholders and the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding, adjusted for own shares held, for the effects of all dilutive potential ordinary shares.

(w) Events after the reporting period

Adjusting events are events that provide further evidence of conditions that existed at the end of the reporting period. The financial statements are adjusted for such events before authorization for issue.

Non-adjusting events are events that are indicative of conditions that arose after the end of the reporting period. Non-adjusting events after the reporting date are not accounted, but disclosed.

- a) As per the advice received from legal experts and on the basis of merit of the case, there is a high probability that the aforesaid impugned orders will be set aside and the demand will be deleted. Accordingly, management is of the view that no provision in respect of the above demands is required to be made in the books of accounts.
- b) For assessment year 2016-17, the Assessing officer has vide its appeal effect order dated 10-01-2026, and following the direction given by ITAT (Delhi), has deleted the demand and has passed the order at Nil. However, the appeal against the penalty order dated 13-03-2024 is still pending with CIT (Appeals). As the original demand has been removed entirely, as a consequential effect the penalty will also be removed.

- iv Appeals are lying pending before the Dy. Excise & Taxation Commissioner-Appeal, Punjab against the Order received from Excise and Taxation Deptt., Punjab in respect of Year 2009-10 and 2010-11 demanding a sum of Rs.450.41 Lacs towards the cess imposed by the State Govt. on exports. The company has challenged the validity of imposition of cess on export in its appeal as the same is not permissible under article 286 of the Constitution of India. Further demand has been raised for Rs. 5.41Lacs after completing the Sales Tax assessment for AY 2011-12 against which appeal has been filed.
- v During the financial year 2016-17, the company has received an order from Hon.'ble Central Excise and Service Tax Appellate Tribunal, New Delh (CETSTAT) against the order passed by Commissioner of Service Tax (Adjudication), New Delhi demanding a service tax of Rs.259.25 Lacs. The Hon'ble CETSTAT vide its order dated 16/02/2017 has granted major relief of Rs.250.13 Lacs against the aforesaid demand. The company has also deposited Rs. 9.00 Lacs against this demand, therefore contingent liability is for Rs. 0.12 Lacs only.
- vi Legal Cases against the Company**
- a) The Board of Trustee of the port of Mumbai has filed a money suit for recovery of Rs. 963.94 Lacs towards alleged outstanding demurrage charges against which the company has filed its counter claim of Rs. 10.88 Cr. towards the financial losses, interest on the investment, refund of the license fees, refund of the demurrage charges, compensation and damages etc. The matter is still pending.
- b) The Municipal Corporation has issued notice to the Builder of Pinnacle Tower for vacating of permises Pinnacle Tower, at Surajkund Faridabad. The Builder obtained interim stay on the order of Muncipal Commissioner, Faridabad from Hon'ble High Court Punjab and Haryana. The company has also approached Hon'ble High Court Chandigarh and Hon'ble High Court Delhi for stay on above matter. Further, the Company filed a petition before the Hon'ble Apex Court with regard to contesting of proceeding before District and Session Court, Faridabad. The Hon'ble Apex Court had allowed the company petition with granting relief to the Company and parties against the impugned order of Faridabad District Court and asked the Company to approach the Hon'ble High Court for seeking direction for further relief. The Company has also deposited the impugned order amount in compliance with the order of the Court. The company is contesting the matter.
- d) A Show Cause Notice under rule 4 of SEBI (Procedure for Holding Inquiry and Imposing Penalties) Rules, 1995 has been issued in the name of Directors and Company. The Directors and Company have already applied for settlement and adjudication application with SEBI.

CREDIT RISK

'Credit risk is the risk that counterparty will not meet its obligations under a financial instrument or customer contract, leading to a financial loss. The Company is exposed to credit risk from its operating activities (primarily trade receivables) and from its financing activities, including cash and cash equivalents and deposits with banks and financial institutions.

CREDIT RISK MANAGEMENT

Trade receivable related credit risk

All trade receivable are reviewed and assessed for default on routine basis. Our historical experience of collecting receivables is of significant credit risk.

Other financial assets

The company maintains exposure in cash and cash equivalents as per its requirements. The Company's maximum exposure to credit risk is the carrying value of each class of financial assets.

LIQUIDITY RISK:

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

TO THE MEMBERS OF KOHINOOR FOODS LIMITED

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the accompanying **Consolidated** financial statements of Kohinoor Foods Limited ("the Holding Company"), and its subsidiaries ("the holding company and its subsidiaries together referred to as "the group") which comprise the Consolidated Balance Sheet as at March 31st, 2026, the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss (including Other Comprehensive Income), the Consolidated Cash Flow Statement and the Consolidated Statement of Changes in equity for the year then ended, and a summary of the significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, **except for the effects/possible effects of the matters described in paragraph under 'Basis for Qualified Opinion'**, the aforesaid consolidated financial statements give the information required by the Act in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India including the Ind AS, of the financial position of the Company as at March 31st, 2026, and its consolidated profit/loss including other comprehensive income, its consolidated cash flows and the changes in equity for the year ended on that date.

This Statement, which is the responsibility of the Holding Company's Management and approved by the Holding Company's Board of Directors, has been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement principles laid down in Indian Accounting Standard 110 "Consolidated Financial Statements" ("Ind AS 110"), prescribed under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013, and other accounting principles generally accepted in India. Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the Statement based on our audit.

We conducted our audit of the Statement in accordance with the Standard on The Auditor's Report on Financial Statements (SA) 700 "The Auditor's Report on Financial Statements Performed by the Independent Auditor of the Entity", issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. An audit of financial information consists of making inquiries, primarily of persons responsible for financial and accounting matters, and applying analytical and other audit procedures. An audit conducted in accordance with Standards on Auditing and consequently does not enable us to obtain assurance that we would become aware of all significant matters that might be identified in an audit.

1. The Statement includes the results of the following entities:

We did not receive the Audited Financial statements of above subsidiaries for the period ended 31st March, 2026. Although there is no significant impact of the financial statements of the subsidiary companies on the Consolidated Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 2026.

Basis for Qualified opinion

1. In reference to **Note No. 39** in the statement discloses the management's assessment of the company's ability to continue as going concern, the assessment is based on the sanction of revised / revival of One time settlement by the lead bank, which has been fully paid by the company. However, in view of continuous operational losses, and negative net worth and due to financial constraints, material uncertainty exists about the company's ability to continue as going concern and the decision of the management of the company to prepare the accounts of the company on going concern basis. There may arise a need to adjust the realizable value of assets and liabilities in the event of failure of assumption as to going concern.
2. As stated in **Note No. 26** of Consolidated Audited Financial Results, the company has not provided interest towards revoked corporate guarantee for the loan given to its wholly owned subsidiary in USA by PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai), to the extent of Rs 318.42 lacs for the current year, Rs. 284.20 lacs for the previous year and Rs. 1528.27 lacs from the date of revocation of corporate guarantee up to 31-03-2026. Further no provision has been made towards penal interest, penalties,



any other Debit or Credit etc. as may be done by lenders. In the absence of reconciliation and complete statement of account from the banks, the above amount has been arrived as per calculation made by the company. With the limited information the aggregate amount un-provided in books of account of the company is not ascertainable with accuracy.

Emphasis of Matters

We draw your attention to the following matters in the Notes to the financial statements:

- (1) The company has not made Provision for the demand raised by various authorities (Such as Income Tax, Vat etc.) as the matters are pending before various appellate forums. We are unable to comment upon possible impact of non-provision in the consolidated financial statement for the year ended 31st March 2026.
- (2) We draw attention to **Note No. 15 (C)(i)** of the statement of the company, the Banks have classified the company's accounts as non-Performing asset and served recall Notice under section 13(2) & 13(4) of The Securitization and Reconstruction of Financial Assets and Enforcement of Security Interest Act, 2002. The company entered into OTS agreement with the Banks and has paid full amount of OTS along with Interest to the lenders.
- (3) In reference to **Note no. 15 (C)(ii)**, of the statement of the Company had received Notices from the Banks under section 13(2) of The Securitization and Reconstruction of Financial Assets and Enforcement of Security Interest Act, 2002, in the month of July, 2018 to May, 2019 and in the month of February 2020 to September 2020. The Company had replied to the notices received from the Bank within 60 days from the date of notices. The Company had also received Notices from the Banks under section 13(4) of The Securitization and Reconstruction of Financial Assets and Enforcement of Security Interest Act, 2002. However the company entered into OTS agreement with the Banks and has paid full amount of OTS along with Interest to the lenders.
- (4) In reference to **Note no. 15 (C)(iii)** of the statement of the company, The lead banker, Punjab National Bank had filed petition under Section 7 of Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016, before the Honbl'e court of NCLT, Chandigarh Bench. As the company has paid in full the agreed One time settlement amount along with interest to the lenders, the petition filed under Section 7 of Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016 has become infructuous and has been disposed off.
- (5) In reference to **Note no. 15(C)(iv)** The Secured Creditors (IDBI Bank) of the Company had filed petition under Section 7 of Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016, before the Hon'ble court of NCLT, Chandigarh Bench. As the company has paid in full the agreed One time settlement amount along with interest to the lenders, the petition filed under Section 7 of Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016 has become infructuous and has been disposed off.
- (6) **Note no. 15(C)(v)** of the financial result stating that The company had received Ex-parte Interim Order dated 25-06-2020 from Debt Recovery Tribunal-III, Delhi in the matter of ICICI Bank Vs. Kohinoor Foods Limited restraining the company from transferring/ alienating or otherwise dealing with, or disposing off or encumbering or creating any third party interest with respect of the hypothecated assets/immovable properties of Company until further orders. The company is contesting the matter and taking necessary action. It has paid in full the agreed One time settlement amount along with interest to the lenders.
- (7) In reference to **Note no. 15(C)(vi)**, of the financial result stating that The Lead Bank had filed petition before DRT Delhi under section 19(4) of the Act. The Company is contesting the matter. It has paid in full the agreed One time settlement amount along with interest to the lenders.
- (8) In reference to **Note no. 15(d)**, The company had issued a corporate guarantee in Favor of PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) for loan granted by PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) to its wholly own subsidiary Kohinoor Foods USA Inc. PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) has invoked the corporate guarantee on default made by Kohinoor Foods USA Inc. The company has recognised the liability of Rs.442957168 /- (previous year Rs.40,88,17,668 /-). The Company has received legal notice from the PNB Hongkong (now PNB-Dubai) in regard to outstanding indebtedness of the due amount. The matter is now being taken up with PNB Dubai and the Company has submitted an OTS proposal for settlement of this liability arising out of corporate guarantee.
- (9) We draw attention to **Note No. 15(e)** of the statement of the company, The Company submitted one time settlement (OTS) resolution plan which was sanctioned for an amount of INR 227.45 crores by the consortium Lenders, during the last year. The company had partly paid the OTS amount last year and has fully paid the balance amount along with interest during the current year. The Company has obtained NOC from 4 out of 6 lenders and is in process of Obtaining remaining NOC from the Lenders along with Consolidated NOC from the Lead Bank in terms of the sanctioned One Time Settlement.



- (10) In reference to **Note no. 27(b)**, During the year the company has written off some balances which are not recoverable and written back some balances which are not payable.
- (11) We draw attention to **Note No. 28** of the statement of the company, During the year the company has sold its Rice Plant situated at Murthal Sonipat, Haryana for a consideration of Rs. 190 Crores and an additional piece of Land for Rs. 8 Crore, out of which Rs. 173 Crores is for Land & Building and Rs. 25 Crores for Machinery. Out of consideration of Rs. 173 crores for land and building, the sale deed of Rs. 82,35,10,345 has been registered till 31 March 2026 and another sale deed of Rs. 80,00,00,000 was registered in May 2026. Balance land parcel of the value of Rs. 10,64,89,655 has not yet been registered. However the company has recognized the sale proceeds and the resulting gain on the entire plant as the possession and control has been transferred to the buyer and the consideration has been received.
- During the previous financial year, based on the One Time Settlement by the Lender Banks, the OTS proposal amount was Rs 227.45 crores, the company had paid substantial amount of Rs 200 crores up to 15-04-2025, The, Exceptional items of Rs 382,74,23,474 during previous year is on account of Gain on OTS.
- (12) In reference to **Note no. 29**, Income tax Expenses for Prior year amounting to Rs. 547.31 lacs pertain to tax demand of previous years. The company had deposited tax in earlier years which have been adjusted by the Tax authorities against such demand.
- (13) In the reference to **Note no. 30(a)**, There was an error in allocation of Revaluation surplus amount different parts of land at Amritsar, a part of which has been sold in earlier year. The previous year profit on sale of assets, Property Plant & Equipment, Revaluation Reserve and General Reserve have been adjusted and previous year figures have been restated accordingly.
- (14) In the reference to **Note no. 30(b)**, The company has entered into OTS with the Lenders, and has paid full amount of OTS during the year. It has also paid interest on delayed payment of OTS amount in full. The interest paid by the company during the year includes Rs. 844.87 lacs pertaining to period from 01-10-2024 to 31.03.2025 which was not provided for in previous year, as the there was a difference of opinion with the banks on interest calculation, which was resolved subsequently. This has been treated as prior period expense and the previous year's interest expense, interest liability and general reserve have been restated.
- (15) In reference to **Note no. 37(C)(vi)(a)**, The Board of Trustee of the port of Mumbai has filed a money suit for recovery of Rs. 963 lacs towards alleged outstanding demurrage charges against which the company has filed its counter claim of Rs. 1088 lacs towards the financial losses, interest on the investment, refund of the license fees, refund of the demurrage charges, compensation and damages etc. The matter is still pending.
- (16) In reference to **Note no. 37(C)(vi)(b)**, The Municipal Corporation has issued notice to the Builder of Pinnacle Tower for vacating of premises Pinnacle Tower, at Surajkund Faridabad. The Builder obtained interim stay on the order of Municipal Commissioner, Faridabad from Hon'ble High Court Punjab and Haryana. The Company also filed a petition before the civil judge, senior division, Faridabad with regard to stay of proceeding against order of Municipal Corporation, Faridabad. The Hon'ble Faridabad Court has stated that already interim stay have been granted by the Hon'ble High Court, hence no ground to grant relief prayed for is made out at this stage.
- (17) In reference to **Note no. 37(C)(vi)(c)**, The company's vendor has filed an execution petition before Faridabad District & Session Judge. The company has also approached Hon'ble High Court Chandigarh and Hon'ble High Court Delhi for stay on above matter. Further, the Company filed a petition before the Hon'ble Apex Court with regard to contesting of proceeding before District and Session Court, Faridabad. The Hon'ble Apex Court had allowed the company petition with granting relief to the Company and parties against the impugned order of Faridabad District Court and asked the Company to approach the Hon'ble High Court for seeking direction for further relief. The Company has also deposited the impugned order amount in compliance with the order of the Court. The company is contesting the matter.
- (18) In reference to **Note no. 37(C)(vi)(d)**, A Show Cause Notice under rule 4 of SEBI (Procedure for Holding Inquiry and Imposing Penalties) Rules, 1995 has been issued in the name of Directors and Company. The Directors and Company have already applied for settlement and adjudication application with SEBI.
- (19) In reference to **Note no.41** of the statement which explains the management's assessment of impairment of assets. As per the assessment of the management, the recoverable amount of assets is higher than it carrying value and hence no impairment of assets needs to be recorded in the financial statements.



- (20) In reference to **Note No.45**, balances of some debtors and creditors are subject to their confirmations.
- (21) In reference to **Note no. 46** corresponding figures for the previous year have been regrouped/rearranged, wherever necessary to confirm to current year classification.

Our opinion is not modified in respect of these matters.

Key Audit Matters.

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. In addition, the matters described in the "basis for qualified opinion" and "emphasis of matter" paragraph are by their nature are key audit matters.

Responsibility of Management's and Those Charged with Governance for the Consolidated Financial Statements

The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the matters stated in Section 134 (5) of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") with respect to the preparation of these consolidated Ind AS financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance including other comprehensive income, cash flows and changes in equity of the Company in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) prescribed under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended, and other accounting principles generally accepted in India. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding the assets of the Company and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate implementation and maintenance of accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the Ind AS financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statement, management is responsible for assessing the company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as application, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Thus, board of directors are also responsible for overseeing the company's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with SAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Report on other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

1. As required by the Companies (Auditor's Report) Order, 2020 issued by the Central Government of India in terms of sub-section (11) of section 143 of the Act, we give in the Annexure A, a statement on the matters specified in the paragraph 3 and 4 of the Order.

 - a) We have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purposes of our audit; except as stated in para under the head "Basis for Qualified Opinion".
 - b) Except for the effects/possible effects of the matters described in the "Basis for Qualified Opinion" paragraph above, in our opinion, proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the Company so far as it appears from our examination of those books;
 - c) The consolidated financial statement dealt within the report are in agreement with the books of account and return;

According to information and explanations given to us and based on our audit, the following material weakness has been identified as at 31st March, 2026.

1. The Company did not have an appropriate internal control system for
 - (a) Customer acceptance;
 - (b) Customer credit evaluation;
 - (c) Establishing customer credit limit for sales;
 - (d) Acceptance of goods by customers and transfer of risk & reward at the time of sales.

This could potentially result in the company recognising revenue without establishing reasonable certainty of ultimate collection.

2. The Company did not have any internal control system for follow-up/recovery/adjustment of old outstanding receivables and payables including balance confirmation and reconciliation.

A 'Material weakness' is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiency, in internal financial control over financial reporting, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the company's annual financial statement will not be prevented or detected on timely basis.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effects/possible effects of basis of qualified opinion, the holding Company has maintained, in all material respects, adequate internal financial controls system over financial reporting and such internal financial controls over financial reporting were operating effectively as at 31st March, 2026, based on the internal control over financial reporting criteria established by the Company considering the essential components of internal control stated in the Guidance Note on Audit of Internal Financial Controls Over Financial Reporting issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

We have considered the material weaknesses identified and reported above in determining the nature, timing and extent of audit tests applied in our audit of the March 31, 2026 consolidated financial statements of the group and these material weaknesses does not affect our opinion on the consolidated financial statements of the company.

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENT

1. Basis of Preparation of Consolidated Financial Statement

These Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (hereinafter referred to as the 'Ind AS') as notified by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2016. The financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2018 were prepared by the company under Ind AS for the first time, with 01-04-2016 as date of transition.

The Financial Statements have been prepared on the historical cost convention on going concern basis and on accruals basis unless otherwise stated. The accounting policies are applied consistently to all the periods presented in the financial statements.

The financial statements of Kohinoor Foods Limited ("hereinafter referred to as company/ holding company/ parent company") together with its subsidiaries (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Group") are consolidated to form Consolidated Financial Statements (CFS). Consolidated Financial Statements consolidate the financial statements of KFL and its Wholly Owned Subsidiaries listed below

Wholly Owned Subsidiary(WOS)

Country of Incorporation

Sachdeva Brothers Pvt Ltd

India

Kohinoor Foods USA Inc.

USA

The parent company has not received audited financial statement from its Joint venture company, Rich Rice Raisers LLC. Rich Rice Raisers LLC has closed its operations. KFL has 25% shareholding in this Joint Venture. The Management considers that the parent company is not in position to exercise control over this entity. Hence the results of Joint venture company Rich Rice Raisers LLC are not considered in the Consolidated Financial Statements.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Principles of Consolidation:

The financial statements of the parent company and its subsidiary companies are combined on a line-by-line basis by adding together the book values of like items of assets, liabilities, income and expenses, after fully eliminating intra-group balances and intra-group transactions in accordance with Accounting Standard (AS)21 "Consolidated Financial Statements".

The results and financial position of all the Group Companies are translated into the reporting currency as follows:

- (i) Current Assets and Liabilities for each balance sheet presented are translated at the closing rate at the date of that balance sheet;
- (ii) Income and expenses for each income statement are translated at average exchange rates.
- (iii) All resulting exchange differences are accumulated in foreign currency translation reserve until the disposal of net investment.

(b) Use of Estimates and Judgments

The preparation of Financial Statements requires management to make certain assumptions and estimates that affect the reported amount, the Financial Statements and Notes thereto. Difference between actual results and estimates are recognized in the period in which they materialize.

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

The Group has adopted revaluation model for land & building. All the assets belonging to these classes of assets are carried at revalued amount being its fair value at the date of revaluation less subsequent depreciation. The Group shall carry out the revaluation of these assets periodically after every 3 to 5 years.

Property, Plant & Equipment under all other classes are stated at cost of acquisition/installation inclusive of freight, duties, and taxes and all incidental expenses and net of accumulated depreciation. In respect of major projects involving construction, related pre-operational expenses form part of the value of assets capitalized. Expenses capitalized also include



applicable borrowing costs. Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost can be measured reliably.

Property, plant and equipment which are not ready for intended use as on the date of Balance Sheet are disclosed as "Capital work-in-progress" and stated at the amount spent up to the date of balance sheet.

Intangible assets are stated at their cost of acquisition.

(d) Depreciation

Depreciation on Property, Plant & Equipment is provided on written down value method, in terms of useful life of the Assets as prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act 2013. The depreciation rates which are different from the principal rates specified in Schedule-II are as follows: -

Tarpaulin	100% p.a.
Wooden & Plastic Crates	100% p.a.

(e) Financial Instruments

(1) Financial Assets

Initial recognition and measurement

All financial assets are initially recognized at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities, which are not at fair value through profit or loss, are adjusted to the fair value on initial recognition.

Subsequent measurement

i) Financial assets carried at amortised cost

A financial asset is measured at amortised cost if it is held within a business model whose objective is to hold the asset in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

ii) Financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)

A financial asset is measured at FVTOCI if it is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

iii) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)

A financial asset which is not classified in any of the above categories are measured at FVTPL.

Other Equity Investments

Equity investments are measured at fair value. Investments which are not held for trading purposes and where the Company has exercised the option to classify the investment as Fair Value through other comprehensive income ('FVTOCI'), all fair value changes on the investment are recognised in OCI.

(2) Financial liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

All financial liabilities are recognized at fair value and in case of loans, net of directly attributable cost. Fees of recurring nature are directly recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss as finance cost.

Subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities are carried at amortized cost using the effective interest method. For trade and other payables maturing within one year from the Balance Sheet date, the carrying amounts approximate fair value due to the short maturity of these instruments.



(3) Derivative financial instruments

Derivative financial instruments such as forward contracts, option contracts and cross currency swaps, to hedge its foreign currency risks are initially recognised at fair value on the date a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently remeasured at their fair value with changes in fair value recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period when they arise.

(f) Fair value measurement

The Group classifies the fair value of its financial instruments, FVTPL and FVTOCI, in the following hierarchy, based on the inputs used in their valuation:

i) Level 1 - The fair value of financial instruments quoted in active markets is based on their quoted closing price at the balance sheet date.

ii) Level 2 - The fair value of financial instruments that are not traded in an active market is determined by using valuation techniques using observable market data. Such valuation techniques include discounted cash flows, standard valuation models based on market parameters for interest rates, yield curves or foreign exchange rates, dealer quotes for similar instruments and use of comparable arm's length transactions.

iii) Level 3 - The fair value of financial instruments that are measured on the basis of entity specific valuations using inputs that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

(g) Dividend to Equity Shareholders

Dividend to Equity Shareholders is recognised as a liability and deducted from shareholders' equity, in the period in which the dividends are approved by the equity shareholders in the general meeting.

(h) Inventories

Raw materials, traded and finished goods are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Stores and spares are carried at cost.

Cost is determined on FIFO (First in First out) basis for raw material, and on weighted average method for all other categories of inventories. Cost comprises expenditure incurred in the normal course of business in bringing such inventories to its present location and condition, where applicable, include appropriate overheads based on normal level of activity.

(i) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

(j) Revenue Recognition

Revenue is measured at fair value of the consideration received or receivable, net of discount, rebate, returns and value added taxes. The revenue is recognized when the amount of revenue can be reliably measured; when it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the entity; and when specific criteria have been met for each of the activities.

Revenue from sale of goods is recognised when all the significant risk and rewards of ownership in the goods are transferred to the buyer as per the terms of the contract, there is no continuing managerial involvement with the goods and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably. On recognition of revenue the Company retains no effective control of the goods transferred to a degree usually associated with ownership and no significant uncertainty exists regarding the amount of the consideration that will be derived from the sale of goods.

Interest income is recognized using the effective interest method. Revenue in respect of Insurance / others claims, Commission, etc. is recognized only when it is reasonably certain that the ultimate collection will be made.

Revenue in respect of sale of licenses, duty drawback and other incentives is recognized on realization basis.

(k) Research and Development

Research expenditure is recognised in the statement of profit and loss as incurred. Development expenditure is capitalised only if the costs can be reliably measured, future economic benefits are probable, the product is technically feasible and



the Company has the intent and the resources to complete the project. Development assets are amortised based on the estimated useful life, as appropriate.

(l) Employee Benefits

Contributions to defined contribution plans are charged to the statement of profit and loss on accrual basis. Present liability for future payment of gratuity is determined on the basis of actuarial valuation at the balance sheet date and the expenses is charged to the statement of profit and loss.

(m) Foreign Currency Transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are recognized at the prevailing exchange rates on the transaction dates. Realised gains and losses on settlement of foreign currency transactions are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Monetary foreign currency assets and liabilities at the year-end are translated at the year-end exchange rates and the resultant exchange differences are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in a foreign currency and measured at historical cost are translated at the exchange rate prevalent at the date of transaction.

(n) Government Grant

Grants from the government are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and the Company will comply with all attached conditions. Grant received from government towards property, plant & equipment's acquired/constructed by the Company is deducted out of gross value of the asset acquired/ constructed and depreciation is charged accordingly..

(o) Borrowing Costs

Borrowing costs consist of interest, ancillary and other costs that the group incurs in connection with the borrowing of funds and interest relating to other financial liabilities. Borrowing costs also include exchange differences to the extent regarded as an adjustment to the borrowing costs.

Interest and other borrowing costs attributable to qualifying assets are capitalised as a part of such assets till such time the assets are ready for use. Other interest and borrowing costs are charged to Statement of Profit and Loss.

(p) Income tax

Current Income Tax:

Current Income Tax is measured at the amount expected to be paid to the tax authorities in accordance with applicable Income Tax law.

Deferred Tax:

Deferred tax is provided using the balance sheet approach on temporary differences between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes at the reporting date. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the tax are those that are enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised.

Current and Deferred tax is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity. In this case, the tax is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Minimum Alternate Tax:

According to section 115JAA of the Income Tax Act, 1961, Minimum Alternative Tax ('MAT') paid over and above the normal income tax in a subject year is eligible for carry forward for fifteen succeeding assessment years for set-off against normal income tax liability. The MAT credit asset is assessed against the Company's normal income tax during the specified period.

Keeping in view of the future business prospect of the company, the company plans to opt for the new tax regime u/s 115 BAA. Considering this, the company has foregone the MAT credit amounting to Rs 4.64 crores and accordingly accounted for the same in the books of accounts.



(q) Leases

At the date of commencement of the lease, the Company recognizes a right-of-use (ROU) asset and a corresponding lease liability for all lease arrangements in which it is a lessee, except for leases with a term of 12 months or less (short term leases) and low value leases. For these short-term and low-value leases, the Company recognizes the lease payments as an operating expense on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

The ROU assets are initially recognized at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or prior to the commencement date of the lease plus any initial direct costs less any lease incentives. They are subsequently measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. ROU assets are depreciated from the commencement date on a straight line basis over the shorter of the lease term and useful life of the underlying asset.

The lease liability is initially measured at amortized cost at the present value of the future lease payments. The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease.

(r) Provisions, Contingent Liability and Contingent Assets

A provision is created when there is a present obligation as a result of past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of obligation. A disclosure of contingent liability is made when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that will probably not require outflow of resources or where a reliable estimate of the obligation cannot be made. Contingent Assets are neither recognised nor disclosed in the Financial Statements.

(s) Impairment of Financial Assets

Expected credit losses are recognized for all financial assets subsequent to initial recognition other than financials assets in FVTPL category.

(t) Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

An assessment is made at each Balance Sheet date whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such Indication exists; the Company estimates the recoverable amount of assets. If such recoverable amount of the assets or the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the assets belong is less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount is reduced to its recoverable amount. The reduction is treated as an impairment loss and is recognised in the statement of Profit & Loss. If at the Balance Sheet date there is an indication that if a previously assessed impairment loss no longer exists, the recoverable amount is reassessed and the assets is reflected at recoverable amount.

(u) Exceptional Items

Exceptional items are disclosed separately in the financial statements where it is necessary to do so to provide further understanding of the financial performance of the company. These are material items of income or expense that have to be shown separately due to their nature or incidence.

(v) Earnings per share

The Consolidated statement of Profit and Loss presents basic and diluted earnings per share data for the ordinary shares of parent company. Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholders of the Company by the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the year. Diluted earnings per share is determined by adjusting the profit or loss attributable to ordinary shareholders and the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding, adjusted for own shares held, for the effects of all dilutive potential ordinary shares.

(w) Events after the reporting period

Adjusting events are events that provide further evidence of conditions that existed at the end of the reporting period. The financial statements are adjusted for such events before authorisation for issue.

Non-adjusting events are events that are indicative of conditions that arose after the end of the reporting period. Non-adjusting events after the reporting date are not accounted, but disclosed.

Accordingly, management is of the view that no provision in respect of the above demands is required to be made in the books of accounts.
- b) For assessment year 2016-17, the Assessing officer has vide its appeal effect order dated 10-01-2026 ,and following the direction given by ITAT (Delhi) . has deleted the demand and has passed the order at Nil.However the appeal against the penalty order dated 13-03-2024 is still pending with CIT (Appeals) . As the original demand has been removed entirely , as a consequential effect the penalty will also be removed.

- iv Appeals are lying pending before the Dy. Excise & Taxation Commissioner-Appeal, Punjab against the Order received from Excise and Taxation Deptt., Punjab in respect of Year 2009-10 and 2010-11 demanding a sum of Rs.450.41 Lacs towards the cess imposed by the State Govt. on exports. The company has challenged the validity of imposition of cess on export in its appeal as the same is not permissible under article 286 of the Constitution of India. Further demand has been raised for Rs. 5.41Lacs after completing the Sales Tax assessment for AY 2011-12 against which appeal has been filed.
- v During the financial year 2016-17, the company has received an order from Hon.'ble Central Excise and Service Tax Appellate Tribunal, New Delh (CETSTAT) against the order passed by Commissioner of Service Tax (Adjudication), New Delhi demanding a service tax of Rs.259.25 Lacs. The Hon'ble CETSTAT vide its order dated 16/02/2017 has granted major relief of Rs.250.13 Lacs against the aforesaid demand. The company has also deposited Rs. 9.00 Lacs against this demand, therefore contingent liability is for Rs. 0.12 Lacs only.



vi Legal Cases against the Company

- a) The Board of Trustee of the port of Mumbai has filed a money suit for recovery of Rs. 963.94 Lacs towards alleged outstanding demurrage charges against which the company has filed its counter claim of Rs. 10.88 Cr. towards the financial losses, interest on the investment, refund of the license fees, refund of the demurrage charges, compensation and damages etc. The matter is still pending.
- b) The Municipal Corporation has issued notice to the Builder of Pinnacle Tower for vacating of permises Pinnacle Tower, at Surajkund Faridabad. The Builder obtained interim stay on the order of Municipal Commissioner, Faridabad from Hon'ble High Court Punjab and Haryana. The Company also filed a petition before the civil judge, senior division, Faridabad with regard to stay of proceeding against order of Municipal Corporation, Faridabad. The Hon'ble Faridabad Court has stated that already interim stay have been granted by the Hon'ble High Court, hence no ground to grant relief prayed for is made out at this stage.
- c) The company's vendor has filed an execution petition before Faridabad District & Session Judge. The company has also approached Hon'ble High Court Chandigarh and Hon'ble High Court Delhi for stay on above matter. Further, the Company filed a petition before the Hon'ble Apex Court with regard to contesting of proceeding before District and Session Court, Faridabad. The Hon'ble Apex Court had allowed the company petition with granting relief to the Company and parties against the impugned order of Faridabad District Court and asked the Company to approach the Hon'ble High Court for seeking direction for further relief. The Company has also deposited the impugned order amount in compliance with the order of the Court. The company is contesting the matter.
- d) A Show Cause Notice under rule 4 of SEBI (Procedure for Holding Inquiry and Imposing Penalties) Rules, 1995 has been issued in the name of Directors and Company. The Directors and Company have already applied for settlement and adjudication application with SEBI.
